'Thanks a million!'

Stellenbosch University (SU) has honoured its top donors for their contribution to the continued excellence and relevance of the institution.

Forty donors received the SU Vice-Chancellor's Award in August at functions held in Stellenbosch and Johannesburg. The award acknowledged their contributions up to 31 December 2010.

"Thank you very much for your donations. This is an investment in the future of our country and continent. The fact that you use Stellenbosch University as an instrument to this end is a motion of confidence in us and in the HOPE Project," said Prof Russel Botman, Rector and Vice-Chancellor.

The University's HOPE Project is a university-wide initiative through which major social challenges are being tackled.

The Vice-Chancellor's Award goes to individuals who have cumulatively donated more than R1 million and institutions that have donated more than R2 million, and the Vice-Chancellor's Award: Gold goes to individuals or institutions that have passed the R5 million mark.

Among the donations recognised were more than one thousand bursaries.

"You have opened the doors of learning to people who would otherwise not have had the opportunity to go to university. Thanks to your magnanimity their lives have been enriched and they have been equipped to help make the world a better place," said Botman.

In addition to the bursaries, the donors also made generous contributions to various fields of study, institutions and initiatives at SU.

"Thanks a million, and I mean that literally," said Botman.

"On behalf of South Africa's 50 million people, and a further 950 million people elsewhere on our continent, I wish to thank you for your support for a university that is

Landman is a former member of the Maties Students' Representative Council and of the University Council, as well as a former board member of the Stellenbosch Trust. HOPE Project captures donor's attention



Mrs Ulrike Merkel, a recipient of a 2011 Vice-Chancellor's Award from Stellenbosch University (SU), made a substantial donation to the HOPE Project despite the fact that she has no ties to Maties.

Originally from Germany, Merkel moved to South Africa in 1989. The devastation and hardship she witnessed during World War II and the difficult years that followed had made her acutely aware of human need and the importance of helping others.

In time, she would make it her mission in life to help the less fortunate. She became an international philanthropist, and upon settling in South Africa started contributing to local healthcare and community development programmes.

Two HOPE Project initiatives captured her attention – the Ukwanda Rural Clinical School and the Academy for Girls' Leadership and Sport Development. She decided to donate to these causes because health matters deserve support, and because she feels strongly that girls should get every opportunity to overcome gender-based discrimination and succeed in life.

The art of giving...

What do you give donors who have given so much to the University? Original artworks by award-winning South African artists, of course.

This was the thought process that led to Christina Bryer and Lucas Bambo being commissioned to produce the works given to recipients of the 2011 Stellenbosch University (SU) Vice-Chancellor's Awards as a token of the institution's appreciation.

Donors in the gold category (donations exceeding R5 million) each received a Bryer porcelain mandala, and recipients of the Vice-Chancellor's Award (donations of over R1 million) got a Bambo linocut print.

Bryer's unique approach to porcelain has earned her great respect in the art world. She initially studied Jewellery Design – first at SU, and later in Germany under the famous Prof Reinhold Reiling.

In 1974 she returned to teach Jewellery Techniques at SU. In 1977 she completed a postgraduate qualification in the UK under

renowned porcelain artist Caroline Whyman.

Bryer constructs every piece individually based on a design system inspired by aperiodic tiling. She utilises natural minerals and oxides, and limits the use of glazes to a minimum to retain a pure, vitrified porcelain finish.

Bambo is a master printmaker, using linocut as his medium. He hails from rural KwaNdebele northeast of Pretoria, where he spent his afternoons painting and sketching. He later studied at the famed Fuba (Federated Union of Black Arts) Academy in Newtown, Johannesburg.

He received a merit award in the Atelier Art Competition, won the Absa Bank Millennium National Art competition in 1999, and was a finalist for the Brett Kebble Art Prize in 2003. He has exhibited in South Africa, Norway, the US, France, Hungary, the UK and Mexico. After making the prints for the Vice-Chancellor's Awards, Bambo destroyed the original linocut to ensure that the recipients' gifts would remain unique.

Daar is baie redes waarom mense gee, en as jy diep daaroor nadink, kan jy jouself maklik knoop. Maar uiteindelik moet jy jouself afvra, maak dit saak hoekom jy gee, solank jy gee?

Die vraag is ook, wanneer moet ons gee?

Daar is 'n gepaste aanhaling hieroor deur Ralph Waldo Emerson: "You cannot do a kindness too soon, for you never know how soon it will be too late."

Ek dink dis baie belangrik. Hoekom wil ons wag tot ons dood is, en dan deur middel van erflatings gee as ons genot daaruit kan put om tydens ons leeftyd te gee?

Die groot vraag is, wat put jy daaruit om te gee? Daar is 'n aanhaling deur Peyton Conway March hieroor: "There is a wonderful mythical law of nature that the three things we crave most in life – happiness, freedom and peace of mind – are always attained by giving them to someone else."




Every gift makes a difference

Last year 6 004 students received undergraduate bursaries at Stellenbosch University (SU), of which 66% were funded by corporates, trusts, foundations and individuals. "The University

is busy shaping the talent and skills needed to help build our country and continent, as every Stellenbosch graduate knows," Ms Bev Witten, Director: Alumni Relations, said.



"Many of our alumni are committed to giving the next generation a hand up. That's why we have established the SU Bursary Fund as a way of channelling alumni giving into student success."

Of the 100 000 alumni on SU's data base, only 0,8% currently lend philanthropic support to their alma mater.

"We would like to double this number by next year," Witten said.

"If 2 000 alumni give R100 per month by debit order, we will raise R2,4 million per year – enough to award full bursaries to 80 students."

New alumni Nico Mans, Paul Antohnie and Alphonso Primo set a good example. They built

up a kitty by contributing R100 each per month. This inspired other alumni to support the fund, which means more opportunities for prospective students.

"It is not about how much you give, but that you give," Witten said.

"Every gift makes a difference – firstly to those who receive bursaries, but ultimately to the whole community."

"The SU Bursary Fund is a way for all our alumni to participate in the University's drive to be a builder of hope in society," Witten added.

Danksy 'n beurs van die Swellendam-beursfonds en bykomende geldelike steun van die US is Kamfer reeds die afgelope agt maande besig om haar droom stap-vir-stap te verwesenlik.

"Toe ek hier aangekom het, het ek niks geweet nie. Nou kan ek al redelik musiek lees. Ek voel gelukkig, want ek kan *swot én perform*," vertel sy.

"Daar is baie wat ek nog wil bereik en ek weet dit gaan tyd vat, maar ek is nou op die regte plek."

Die Sertifikaatprogram bied onder meer aan lede van voorheen benadeelde groepe toegang tot musiekonderrig. Dit dien as springplank tot die Universiteit se graad- en diplomaprogramme, sê die koördineerder, me Felicia Lesch.

Vermeulen is 'n US-personeellid wat in 2006 vir die Sertifikaatprogram ingeskryf het en tans die afriger van die program se *Gig Band* is. Hy sê: "Ek kan soms nie glo hoeveel ek geleer het as ek terugkyk na waar ek begin het nie. Daarom is dit vir my belangrik om jonger studente te help."

SU reaches out to schools, learners

South Africa needs an increased supply of doctors, engineers, accountants and the like if it wants to meet its development targets. But not enough school leavers have the necessary background in science and mathematics to gain access to these fields of study at tertiary level. Two initiatives at Stellenbosch University aim to address this problem: SciMathUS and TRAC SA. Both have been generously supported by donors through the years, and the University recognised these contributions at its 2011 Vice-Chancellor's Awards.

Bridge to success

Stellenbosch University's bridging programme in Science and Mathematics (SciMathUS) is a year-long course catering for talented and motivated students from educationally disadvantaged backgrounds. Alongside the core academic subjects of Mathematics, Physical Sciences, Accounting and Introduction to Economics, additional skills-based subjects are taught. This lays a solid foundation for future success, as many students will testify. Seven recipients of the 2011 Vice-Chancellor's Award made substantial contributions to SciMathUS and its institutional home, IMSTUS: the DG Murray Trust, Fasset (Seta), Investec Bank, Namakwa Sands, Rand Merchant Bank, Remgro, and the Stella & Paul Loevenstein Trust.

Dear SciMathUS,
At the end of my matric year, I failed maths on higher grade and therefore did not qualify to study accounting at university. I was heartbroken. I felt that I had disappointed those who supported me.
At Stellenbosch University I was referred to SciMathUS. For somebody who had never failed a school term in her life, this seemed disastrous. But I thought I had better settle for "second best" since I had run out of options.
I reluctantly started the year at SciMathUS. At first I thought it was a waste of time. But I soon realised I was being prepared for so much more than just to get access to varsity.
SciMathUS filled the gap between school and university perfectly. I learnt about discipline, how to manage my time and, most importantly, how to stay focused. I ended up passing both maths and accounting – with impressive marks!
To my surprise almost all of my friends who had enrolled ahead of me were repeating their first year, so I had not fallen behind at all. In fact, I managed to finish ahead of most!
After varsity, I articled at one of the biggest auditing firms in the country. Sometimes it was hard to work with extremely difficult clients. But yet again, I could fall back on what I had learnt.
Today, I am a very happy Financial Accountant at another big firm. I am forever indebted to SciMathUS for giving me a second chance.

Reaching tomorrow's engineers

South Africa's education system performs poorly in physical science and mathematics. In 2009, less than 37% of grade 12 learners who sat the physical science exams passed. This figure improved to 48% in 2010, but it still means that more than half the learners taking the subject are failing.

The Technology Research Activity Centre for South Africa (TRAC SA) works to redress this problem.

This community interaction programme based in the Department of Civil Engineering at Stellenbosch University (SU) is aimed at supporting and uplifting science and technology education in South African secondary schools.

"TRAC encourages learners to enter into careers in science, engineering, and technology," says Ms Debby Olivier, Executive Director.

"This is done with classroom intervention in schools, based on the principle that practical experiential learning is essential for understanding even the most basic of theoretical concepts."

TRAC works with learners and educators. The programme provides equipment, curriculum content, vocational guidance information, and a variety of other material to developing communities, especially in rural

areas, where essential resources are limited or lacking.

TRAC facilities and activities include:

- 24 mobile and 6 fixed laboratories
- 40 physical science and 14 related mathematical experiment worksheets, all linked to the South African school curriculum
- Educational research and development programmes
- A comprehensive engineering and artisanship career guidance booklet

The TRAC programme was initiated many years ago as a hands-on outreach program of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials. The programme came to South Africa in 1994 and was adapted for local needs and circumstances. It has since grown from a single site to a programme with nationwide facilities.

"Our expansion and success is linked to the valuable support we receive from our financial partners," says Olivier.

Four recipients of the 2011 SU Vice-Chancellor's Award are TRAC donors: Murray & Roberts, the Gautrain Management Agency, the Transnet Foundation and the Coega Development Corporation.
