JS Gericke hosts Library Research Week

Emerging researchers were treated to a host of activities ranging from a writing workshop to a panel discussion on postgraduate supervision at the JS Gericke Library between 12 and 16 August.

Framing the activities was Library Research Week, presented at the University for the first time to address the unique interests of this target group.

Opening the event in the Research Commons, Vice-Rector Prof Eugene Cloete reminded guests of research and innovation objectives to achieve the new vision of the University.

"Emboldened support for postgraduate researchers and the development of young academic stars are prerequisites for achieving success," he said.

Aiming to do exactly this with Library Research Week, three themes addressed the unique interests of researchers within the broader context of their academic and emotional lives. "Writing rescue" consisted of a writing workshop presented by the Language Centre to "save researchers from drowning in the writing process".

Another theme, "Finding peers and building networks", was explored through case studies and tools which emphasise the importance and benefits

of collaboration.

The most popular theme, "Research rescue", focused on research stress and relationships. In this session, a panel of students and supervisors called for the updating of the University's code of conduct for supervisors, while an enlightening talk by Prof Gielie van Dyk (Military Science) reassured the audience about the realness of research stress.

Closing the week on a festive note, a "coffee expression" event was held where students exchanged feedback on the Library for coffee and doughnuts. Ellen Tise, Head of the Library,

SU representatives ready to study in Europe

Thanks to SU's association with the Erasmus Mundus Action 2 scholarship programme, 32 postgraduate students and staff recently received scholarships to pursue study programmes in Europe.

The majority of the 192 Erasmus Mundus scholarships were awarded to SU students and staff. They will participate in three Erasmus Mundus programmes: EUROS (11 participants), ema2sa (15 participants) and EU Saturn (6 participants). Since the inception of these programmes at SU in 2010, the number of participants among students and staff has steadily increased. This year, the scholarship recipients include five SU staff members, 17 Masters students and ten PhD researchers.

The participants' exposure to European institutions promises to offer enriching academic and sociocultural experiences. It will be especially

beneficial to PhD students as many already foresee a career in academia.

"We are happy that they will be exposed to a European institution early on and bring back that knowledge and dynamic to South Africa," says Huba Boshoff, Coordinator: Outgoing Exchanges at the Postgraduate and International Office.

In addition to creating international academic opportunities, the Erasmus Mundus programmes also aid in fostering closer relationships between Stellenbosch and European and South African institutions alike.

"It is a great opportunity for us to work with other universities within the context of South Africa," says Boshoff.

As a sign of the continuing strengthening of SU's relationship with Erasmus Mundus, the University has again been approved to participate in the EUROS scholarship programme.

Cook appointed as IOSOT president

Prof Johann Cook, a lecturer at SU's Department of Ancient Studies and researcher specialising in the Septuagint (the Greek translation of the Hebrew Bible), was recently appointed as President of the International Organisation for the Study of the Old Testament (IOSOT). The news was officially announced at an IOSOT business meeting in Munich, Germany, in August.

The IOSOT conference is held every three years and with Cook's appointment, SU will become the first African institution to host the conference in 2016.

Cook, who will serve as President until 2016, says: "This is really amazing but still feels very unreal."

TSAMA Hub soek oplossings vir armoede

SDI is 'n transnasionale NGO wat in 1996 gestig is. Dit is tans in Suid-Afrika en Nederland geregistreer, met lidlande in Afrika, Asië en Latyns-Amerika. Dit verteenwoordig "federasies" van stedelike armes en haweloze groepe wat georganiseer is op stedelike of nasionale vlak.

Die TSAMA Hub dien as 'n koördinerende mechanisme wat gebruik maak van die transdisiplinêre potensiaal wat daar tussen verskillende US fakulteite en departemente bestaan wat belang en kundigheid

Volgens Bolnick is een van die doelwitte van die memorandum om nuwe kennis te skep, veral oor informele metodes wat reeds binne arm stedelike gemeenskappe bestaan. "Ons wil dié metodes formaliseer deur erkenning te gee aan vaardighede."

Van Breda sê dit sal 'n geleentheid skep om wetenskap in samewerking met die gemeenskap te beoefen.

Matié sets world record at Transplant Games

Koenraad Pretorius, a third-year BComm student at SU, raked in the medals for swimming and set a world record at the recent World Transplant Games in Durban.

Pretorius won a total of six medals, including two bronze and three silver medals in the individual freestyle, backstroke, butterfly and in the freestyle and medley relays. He also won gold in the 50m backstroke and set a new world record when he won the event in a time of 32 seconds, breaking the record by 0,4 seconds.

The World Transplant Games serve as the biggest organ donor awareness event in the world.

Pretorius, who was diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder when he was six weeks old, had a liver transplant at the age of four. The 22-year-old says he is very proud and honoured to be able to compete in swimming after his transplant.

Creative ideas at Women's Day event

On Women's Day, 9 August, Stellenbosch University and the Women's Forum acknowledged the importance of gender in the visual redress envisaged for an inclusive campus.

Women's Day is significant because it reminds us that 54 years ago South African women were thought-leaders in the most difficult of times, says Monica du Toit, HIV coordinator at the SU. "I believe we have not finished telling this story and I can hardly think of a better place than a university to reflect on our interpretations of Women's Day."

As part of this year's Women's Day celebrations, fourth year students of the Department of Visual Arts were asked to design a proposal for a permanent visual work that portrays women interests, participation or leadership on campus. These visual redress design ideas were unveiled to the campus community on Wednesday, 7 August.

They included umbrella-type structures to provide light and offer shelter along routes on campus, special gardens, scaffolding (as a teaching strategy) to make people aware of the prominent presence of masculinity on campus, illuminated play areas that provide space for interaction, a

campaign to create awareness about abuse, and bamboo seats in the form of a hand.

Prof Julian Smith, Vice-Rector (Community Interaction and Personnel), said in his welcoming speech that we should continuously strive towards all types of equality. "It has to become a way of life," he added.

He was very impressed with the

students' presentations and praised the "wealth of ideas". He regarded it as a very innovative and inspiring way to celebrate Women's Day.

Prof Amanda Gouws, chairperson of the Women's Forum, also thought it was a wonderful event and added that the forum will dedicate itself to ensure that some of the ideas are implemented.

Gender reconciliation partnership launched

Confronting gender inequality and bringing about gender reconciliation.

These are the main aims of a new gender reconciliation partnership between the Desmond and Leah Tutu Legacy Foundation, Gender Reconciliation International (GRI) and Stellenbosch University, launched on 20 August.

Emeritus Archbishop Desmond Tutu, SU Rector Prof Russel Botman, GRI founders Dr William Keepin and Rev Cynthia Brix, as well as CEO of the Desmond and Leah Tutu Legacy Foundation, Rev Mpho Tutu, were part of a panel discussing this new partnership.

The event was held at SU's Tygerberg Campus.

The partnership will focus on the implementation of gender reconciliation, applying principles of South Africa's truth and reconciliation process to restore people's faith in one another.

Botman thanked the representatives of GRI and the Desmond and Leah Tutu Legacy Foundation that SU can be part of this project. "This year represents a milestone in SA higher education. The first 'born frees' have enrolled on our campuses. But in February, we buried a 'born free', 17-year-old Anene Booyens of Bredasdorp after she was brutally raped and left for dead."

The initial focus of the partnership will be a series of introductory workshops and a facilitator training programme. SU's Frederik van Zyl Slabbert Institute for Student Leadership Development (FVZS Institute) will be used as a platform to roll out the programme.

The GRI project will train some 25 student leaders between the ages 18 and 30 years in gender reconciliation facilitation, a process for healing and reconciliation of dysfunctional gender dynamics and behavioural patterns between men and women in South Africa. The trained facilitators will then be able to facilitate GR workshops for their peers under the supervision of a qualified GR Trainer.

Myntmaatskappy ondersteun akwaponika-navorsing aan die Universiteit

Akwakultuurkenners en akkerboukundiges van die US en die myntmaatskappy Richmond Mining and Exploration het kragte saamgespan in 'n navorsingsprojek om te kyk watter akwaponika-tegnieke werk die beste wanneer daar saam-saam met visse en plante geboer word.

Die projek sal na verwagting uitloop op die grootskaalse kommersialisering van die prosesse wat ontwikkel word.

Richmond Mining and Exploration befonds onder meer die installering van 'n nuwe akwaponika-stelsel wat vir die volgende jaar in proefnemings deur personeel en nagraadse studente van die US Afdeling Akwakultuur en die Departement Agronomie in die Fakulteit AgriWetenskappe gebruik gaan word. 'n Span van Richmond, onder leiding van besturende direkteur Martiens van der Merwe, het aan die begin van Augustus self by die Welgevallen Proefplaas die nodige infrastruktuur geïnstalleer.

In akwaponika word die beginsels van hidroponika en akwakultuur geïntegreer om vis en plante saam te kweek in afsonderlike eenhede. Die ideal is dat die plante – van slaai en waterlelies tot tamaties – die meeste van hul voedingstowwe uit die water sal kry wat vanuit die visdamme sirkuleer.

Volgens Henk Stander van die US Afdeling Akwakultuur sal die prototipe gedurende die volgende paar maande deeglik getoets word, waarna dit teen die begin 2014 gereed sal wees om die sukses van verskillende kombinasies groeimediums, plante en visse te toets.

Die metodes en kombinasies wat uiteindelik die groen lig kry vanaf die US-navorsers sal na verwagting teen 2015 op 'n kommersiële skaal in die Dullstroom-omgewing geïmplementeer word.

50 years of nursing

In August, Stellenbosch University's Division of Nursing at the Tygerberg Campus celebrated its 50th year. WILMA STASSEN explored the archives and tells us more about the history of nursing at SU.

In January 1963, the first 10 students to be trained in nursing reported at SU's medical campus in Tygerberg. It was not only a new beginning for these students, but also the establishment of the Division of Nursing at the University.

The actual inception of the degree in nursing at SU came about on 15 June 1962 with the approval of the senate to establish the BA-degree in Nursing. Miss AM Venter, then head of the Otto Du Plessis Nursing College and later professor and head of the Department of Nursing at the University of the Western Cape (UWC), played a leading role in the establishment of the degree course at US.

The curriculum was accepted on 6 August 1962 and entailed a total of 6 226 clinical hours over a four year period. "At that time the students hardly had holidays," says Dr Ethelwynn Stellenberg, currently Acting Head at the Division of Nursing. "These days, undergraduate nursing students are required to do 4 000 clinical hours."

In 1963, Isabel Hofmeyr joined the division as a part-time lecturer, and in 1964 became the first Head of Department. She was the second nurse in the country who obtained a doctorate and the first one with a D.Ed. In May 1973 she was promoted to professor.

Under her guidance the Department of Nursing grew, and in her term at the University the Diploma in Nursing Education, two other diploma courses and five postgraduate courses were introduced. Hofmeyr headed the Department for 26 years, until her retirement in December 1989.

Prof Hof, as her students and colleagues called her, had a few extraordinary approaches. "The lecturers had to wear uniforms," Stellenberg says. "In the winter they wore maroon and in summer cream coloured suits."

The staff uniforms were abolished when Prof Barene Welmann was appointed as Head of Department in 1990. "She also encouraged me to wear long pants to work – at the time it was unheard of," says Stellenberg, who served as a lecturer under Welmann.



Her vision contributed to the transformation of the postgraduate programmes in providing for the changing needs of the community, services and students. New programmes in critical-care nursing, advanced midwifery and psychiatric nursing, operating room nursing and primary health care were established under her guidance.

The introduction of three postgraduate programmes by satellite in 2000 brought about a drastic increase in student numbers. But in 2002 a cabinet decision was made by the late minister Kadar Asmal whereby undergraduate nursing programmes in the Western Cape could only be offered by UWC and Cape Peninsula University of Technology.

"We trained such excellent students, I could not believe it. On top of it we lost half of our staff in 2005 because of the changeover," says Stellenberg.

Thereafter, the Division focused on the postgraduate programmes in Nursing and offered also three undergraduate modules for UWC through a common teaching platform (CTP), which was established to prevent the loss of expertise of lecturers at US and the University of Cape Town.

The Division has taken on a blended teaching approach in the presentation of their programmes in order to be more student and employer friendly, and programmes now also include telematic broadcastings. "Here in the Western Cape we are the biggest postgraduate nursing division," says Stellenberg. The student load is more than 500 postgraduate students in different specialities with an average of 600

students in the CTP. There are 21 academic lecturers, seven administrative support staff and 27 clinical facilitators.

Although they have had success at postgraduate level, the Division hopes to start an undergraduate programme again and intend to develop a Baccalaureus Degree in Rural Nursing at the Rural Clinical School in Worcester.

"The Division's vision for the following 50 years is to develop into a strong, research intensive nursing school," says Stellenberg. "We teach and train people, it is part of our portfolio, but we must also strengthen our research component – universities are meant to do research."

Stellenberg has a clear goal: In the future the Division would like to expand on an international level and have a "footprint" on every continent. There are already agreements with the City University of New York and Johns Hopkins in the USA, and soon with Norway, Sweden and Cameroon.

Timeline of nursing at SU

- 1962: Introduction of a degree course in Nursing at SU.
- 1963: The first 10 students start the degree course in January.
- 1964: Isabel Hofmeyr is appointed as lecturer and becomes the first Head of Department.
- 1966: First group of students graduates.
- 1969: The name of the undergraduate programme changes to B in Nursing and later to BCUR.
- 1985: A formal working agreement is signed between the University and CPA to offer an integrated nursing course.
- 1987: The first 34 students complete the integrated nursing course.
- 1990: Prof Barene Welmann is appointed as Head of Department.
- 1991: The Henrietta Stockdale Memorial lecture is instituted to commemorate the state registration of Nursing in 1891.
- 1994: Dr Ethelwynn Stellenberg, the first non-white lecturer is appointed.
- 1995: Estelle Bester is the first student of the Department of Nursing who obtains her DCur-degree.
- 2005: The Department of Nursing changes to the Division of Nursing. The first large group of 305 postgraduate students complete their degrees via interactive satellite broadcastings.
- 2007: The last group of undergraduate students at US obtain their degrees in Nursing.
- 2009: The Dr Pat Gorvalla Award for the excellence in nursing leadership is instituted.

Personeel en medestudente let dikwels op dat 'n student in nood is, maar om direk te help is nie altyd moontlik nie. Sulke gevalle kan na Witbooi verwys word, wat die situasie altyd eers assesseer om te bepaal watter maatskaplike intervensies die student benodig om in sy/haar behoeftes te kan voorsien.

Monica du Toit, bestuurder in die Kantoor vir Institusionele MIV-koördinering en een van die inisieerders van die veldtog, sê studentesukses het baie dimensies. "Hierdie studente in nood is gewoonlik baie gemotiveerd, maar hulle kan nie voorsien wat alles sal skeefloop nie. Life happens. Ons kan nie net sê jammer, maar dis nie ons probleem nie. Ons moet bereid wees om studente tot by hul graad te neem."

"In Mens kan nie net aanvaar dat alle studente geld het omdat hulle hier studeer nie. Sommige studente ontvang beurse, maar daar is niks ekstra by die huis nie en wanneer 'n krisis ontstaan, is hulle in groot nood."

Suksesse met fondsverwining

Die Universiteit Stellenbosch het homself gevestig as 'n instansie van uitnemendheid én relevansie, en te oordeel aan sy onlangse fondsverwingsuksesse, gefasiliteer deur die Afdeling Institusionele Bevordering, is hierdie reputasie besig om vrugte af te werp. Deur ILSE ARENDSE.

Teen 31 Julie vanjaar het die Afdeling Institusionele Bevordering reeds R176 miljoen (82%) van sy alghele fondsverwingssteiken van R215 miljoen vir 2013 bereik.

Institusionele Bevordering – wat bestaan uit die onderafdelings Alumni-verhoudinge, Kommunikasie en Skakeling, en Ontwikkeling – is verantwoordelik daarvoor om verhoudinge te bou, bewustheid te skep en ondersteuning te bewerkstellig vir die US se akademiese, navorsing- en gemeenskapsinteraksie-visie, en om private filantropiese skenkings te verseker.

"Stellenbosch se aansien neem voortdurend toe. Ons het meer as R75 miljoen van internasionale befondser ontvang – die teiken vir 2013 is R76 miljoen. Wat individuele skenkings betref lyk die prentjie ewe rooskleurig. Teikens is onderskeidelik gestel op R20 miljoen en R23 miljoen, en teen 31 Julie vanjaar het ons reeds meer as R12 miljoen en R19 miljoen behaal," sê Annamia van den Heever, Direkteur: Ontwikkeling.

Ondersteuning van Suid-Afrikaanse maatskappye bly konstant, veral vir beurse en projekte wat daarop gemik is om die land se wiskunde-, wetenskap- en ingenieursbasis uit te bou.

Sidney van Heerden, wat met die US se groot individuele skenkings werk, sê dit is opwindend en 'n voorreg om 'n aandeel te hê in die bou van die US se toekoms. "Ons moedig skenkers aan om by akademiese inisiatiewe betrokke te raak wat hulle na aan die hart lê."

Die Alumni-kantoor woeker ook. Hulle het onder meer fokusgroepes bymekaargebring in 'n poging om alumni beter te betrek en te verstaan. Volgens Bev Witten, Senior Direkteur: Alumni-verhoudings, het hierdie groepes waardevolle terugvoering gegee wat nou in hul fondsinsamelingstrategie ingesluit word. 'n Elektroniese nuusbrief (e-lumnus) is ook van stapel gestuur om beter kontak met alumni te maak en om skenkings te fasiliteer.



Witten sê voorts: "Alumni-skenkings is die grondslag van volgehoue skenkings by enige hoëronderwysinstelling. Ons is geen uitsondering nie.

Elke bydrae tel en dit is die kollektiewe skenkings van ons alumni wat die grootste impak maak. Hulle is ons ambassadeurs, ons bondgenote en ons grootste hulpbron. Hul sukses is 'n toonbeeld van die US se sukses."

Fahim Docrat, Bestuurder by Alumni-verhoudinge, sê: "Ons het vanjaar twee telethons gehou waar ons alumni gevra het om die US Beursfonds te ondersteun. Die telethon het gehelp met 'n toename van 18% in nuwe skenkars wat groot potensiële toekomstige skenkings

verteeenwoordig." Volgens Docrat het uitreikpogings in KwaZulu-Natal ook geleid tot 'n verbintenis van R2 miljoen in beurse van 'n groot korporatiewe maatskappy vir 2014. Hy sê een alumnus was so beïndruk met die Universiteit se rigting dat hy hom verbind het tot R35 miljoen in die vorm van 'n erfating.

Van den Heever glo daar is verskeie redes vir die welwillendheid teenoor die US. "Visie 2030 stuur 'n sterk, positiewe boodskap uit," sê sy. Die doel is vir die Universiteit om 'n meer inklusiewe, innoverende en toekomsgerigte instelling te word – 'n plek waar personeel en studente denkleiers kan wees.



Water is lewe

Sonder skoon water kan ons nie leef nie. Dit geld nie net vir drinkwater nie, maar ook rivierwater wat vir besproeiing gebruik word, omdat dit 'n invloed op voedselveiligheid én ons gesondheid het.

Die Plankenburg- en Eersteriviere krommel soos are deur Stellenbosch. Maar weens erge besoedeling is dié riviere nie juis lewensare nie, maar eerder 'n bedreiging vir mense se gesondheid.

Ons word van kindsbeen af geleer oor die belangrikheid van water en dat ons nie daarsonder kan oorleef nie. Tog is dit die mens wat riviere besoedel en sy eie gesondheid in gevaar stel.

'n Nasionale studie oor voedselveiligheid waarby US-navorser – onder ander die voedselwetenskaplikes prof Trevor Britz en dr Gunnar Sigge – betrokke was, wys dat Stellenbosch se rivier nie gesond is nie. Die opdrag vir dié studie is in 2007 deur die Waternavorsingskommissie en die Departement van Landbou, Bosbou en Visserye gegee.

Die vlakke van menslike ontlasting en patogene wat siektes veroorsaak in die Eerste- en Plankenburgriviere word as "onaanvaarbaar" en "onhygiënies" beskryf. Mense wat die riviere vir sport en ontspanning gebruik, kan siektes soos diarree, voedselvergiftiging en allerlei infeksies opdoen.

Díe riviere word stroomop en stroomaf van die dorp gebruik om veral in die somermaande onder meer druive, pere, sitrusvrugte, aarbeie, soetrissies, kruie en groenbone te besproei.

'n Groot verskeidenheid en uiters hoë vlakke van fekale bakteriëë, protosoë en virusse is in die water gevind en op produkte wat uit die riviere besproei is. Dit kan skadelik wees vir mense indien die produktes rou geëet word sonder dat dit deeglik gewas word.

"Die hoë tellings van *Salmonella* hou byvoorbeeld 'n ernstige risiko vir voedselvergiftiging in, aangesien sommige inwoners langs die rivier die water vir tuinmaak- of huishoudelike doeleinades aanwend," sê Britz.

Sy raad aan inwoners: "Moenie in hierdie riviere swem of onbehandelde water drink nie, en indien jy vrugte of groente eet wat uit hierdie riviere besproei is, maak seker dat jy dit goed was, verkiekslik met 'n lige ontsmettingsmiddel soos Milton in die water." – ENGELA DUVENAGE



From sport to insects

In July, scientist Prof John Terblanche was one of four young outstanding scientists worldwide to be awarded with a President's Medal from the International Society for Experimental Biology in Spain.

ENGELA DUVENAGE spoke to him about his research interests.

What did entomologist Prof John Terblanche learn from athletes that he now uses in his research on insects? He learnt that sometimes they can be stretched way beyond their presumed abilities to excel beyond expectation.

This 36-year-old associate professor in the Department of Conservation Ecology and Entomology lectures among others in insect physiology.

Although he obtained an undergraduate degree in sport science and a MSc in Human Physiology, both from SU, his passion nowadays lies in finding out just how insects cope in extreme environments and handle changing climates. "My background has provided me with an interest in the range of flexibility that an organism possesses and allows it to change its physiological ability over the course of its lifetime," he says. Woolly bear caterpillars, dung beetles, tsetse flies and

malaria-causing mosquitoes count among the species he studies along with his 10 postgraduate students to find biochemical links to explain how insects survive environmental stress. Terblanche often works on projects with his wife, Dr Susana Clusella-Trullas of the DST-NRF Centre of Excellence for Invasion Biology (CIB), whom he met through their mutual love of rock climbing.

His research has taken him from Kenya, Tanzania and Zambia to Germany and Austria. However, the three months he spent in the summer of 2002/2003 at Cape Hallett in the Antarctic was life-changing. Three years later, he also visited Marion Island to research how terrestrial invertebrates cope with extremely low temperatures.

"I became fascinated with finding out how animals are able to physically adapt and overcome the diverse environmental challenges of life on Earth," he remembers the impact of these experiences.

As a PhD student in Zoology, his attention shifted to the hotter extreme to investigate how tsetse flies cope at extreme temperatures and in dry environments, and how their metabolic systems adapt accordingly. The work, done under guidance of former CIB director Prof Steven Chown, produced many significant insights into physiological adaptation. Notably, Terblanche showed that inter-

population differences in physiology across Africa are because of phenotypic plasticity, which is an organism's ability to change its phenotype or traits in response to changes in the environment.

There is of course always an exception to the rule, and in this case it is the relationship between metabolic rate and temperature. "This relationship evolved very specifically hand-in-hand with climate," he summarises the findings of his PhD dissertation.

"While it's clear that climate change will impact insects

through changes in temperature and water supply, there is surprisingly little agreement about how it works or what the effects are," says Terblanche, who was named as one of the 2013 top 25 researchers at SU, and was a NSTF-Billiton finalist.

Data from Terblanche's research contributes to this ongoing debate. He suggests that the geographical range of some insect disease-causing species will decrease, but it could be offset by disease transmission risk that becomes higher in specific locations.
