“Dit het my nederig laat voel en opnuut laat besef dat ek erkenning aan my medemens moet gee en moet wys ek gee om – nie net vir een dag nie, maar elke dag.”

Dit was die woorde van me Joanne Williams van die Afdeling Gemeenskapsinteraksie nadat sy deel was van 'n groep wat op Mandela-dag (18 Julie) Huis Ebenhaeser, 'n ouetehuis in Cloeteville, besoek het.

Op Mandela-dag, 'n dag ter ere van oudpres Nelson Mandela, word daar 'n beroep op mense regoor die wêreld gedoen om 67 minute van hul tyd af te staan om minderbevoorregtes te help.

“Om tyd by Huis Ebenhaeser te spandeer het my toegelaat om my eie werklikheid te verlaat en tyd met ouer, dikwels vergete mense te spandeer en om vir 'n rukkie deel te word van hul realiteit. Hul stories en wysheid het my herinner dat daar meer aan die lewe is wat ons dalk vergeet wanneer ons gedompel is in ons eie lewens en realiteite,” het Williams gesê.

Verskeie US-personeellede het op 18 Julie moue opgerol en gewys hulle gee om. By die USB Bestuursontwikkeling (USB-BO) op die Bellville-kampus het personeel 300 toebroodjies gemaak en aan leerlinge by Klipheuwel Primêre Skool in Durbanville afgelewer. Skryfbehoeftes is bymeakaargemaak en ook aan die skool geskenk.

Personeel van die Afdeling Kommunikasie en Skakeling het babaklere by die Stellenbosch Hospitaal se kraamsaal afgelewer. “Die breiprojek gee ons die kans om deurlopend 'n verskil te maak en dié wat

nie kans sien vir brei nie, maak hul beursies oop,” het me Susan van der Merwe gesê.

Vyftien personeellede van die Afdeling Navorsingontwikkeling het hul tyd geskenk aan Kuyasa Horizon Empowerment, wat leierskapsontwikkelingsprogramme in Kayamandi aanbied. “Almal het regtig die ervaring geniet en het belowe om 'n verhouding met daardie organisasie te handhaaf,” het mnr Mawethu Nyakatya, Koördineerder: Navorsingsvennootskappe en -kommunikasie, laat weet.

'n Span van Menslike Hulpbronne het die Steintal-kinderhuis in Tulbagh besoek. Hulle het 200 kasdeure met nuwes vervang, asook die 160 kinders vermaak en middagete vir hulle voorberei.

SUN MeDIA Stellenbosch het hul 67 minute aan die Stellenbosse Kinderwelsyn geskenk. Die personeel het winterklere, kos en speelgoed geskenk.

New e-home focuses on needs of SU's postgraduate students

Current postgraduate students now have their own dedicated electronic home on the Stellenbosch University website. Stellenbosch Postgrad, the portal for postgraduate students was launched by the Postgraduate and International Office (PGIO) today (1 August).

“This portal is a virtual service aimed at supporting postgraduate

success at SU,” says Ms Dorothy Stevens, Assistant Director: Postgraduate and International Office.

“We are developing a range of focused support services to promote SU's objective of increasing the number of postgraduate students enrolled at our university, while at the same time strengthening the university's position as a research-

driven academic institution.

“At the Postgraduate and International Office we understand that the academic needs of our postgraduate students differ from those of undergraduate students. That is why we developed Stellenbosch Postgrad,” Stevens says.

As postgraduate students need to access information related to

the research process, a research toolkit has been added to the portal, as well as a direct route to the JS Gericke Library's new academic search tool, called SUNSearch.

Via the portal postgraduate students can view specific skills development opportunities, find research-related news and have access to all their official

university documentation.

Stevens invited comments and suggestions via the feedback mechanism on the portal at www.sun.ac.za/postgrad.

“We trust that Stellenbosch Postgrad will become a valuable tool. It will evolve over time, but we need feedback to guide this process,” she says.

Pronouncing African language names correctly

Hard Acorn to Crack complains (in the June 2011 issue), rightly so, about the not-so-good pronunciation of African language names at SU graduations. The Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences pronounces African languages very well, though it can improve.

May I suggest a general solution: the person who will be reading the graduates' names can ask assistance, prior to graduation, from people who are very familiar with several African languages in southern Africa. The help can be in the form of transference of African language spelling systems into the reader's language. For example, if the reader is Afrikaans-speaking, he should be made aware that the African language sound [j] in *Jamludi* is pronounced like the English [j] in *John*, and not like the [y] Afrikaans sound, and that the Venda sound [v] is pronounced [b], as in *broer*, but that the same language has a [vh] sound that is like *want*.

But let me point out that African languages are not homogenous. They are as different as Germanic languages are. Some sounds remain ever problematic, for example the laterals [hl; tl; tlh] are hard to pronounce for African language-speakers north of the Limpopo river.

Pronunciation problems are a result of lack of good exposure to the various languages in the country. On this core, may I remark that those who did Afrikaans, English and an African language at school, are excellent pronouncers of almost all South African languages, and therefore are well placed to help.

If I may humbly advise: SA children should learn three primary school languages: Afrikaans, English and one local African language

(Black African children learned with success three languages from Grade 1 in the previous government education). This is to nurture future South Africans who will function in several languages. The present curriculum allows for the learning of three languages in the GET and FET phases. It should not go to the extent where an African language becomes a prerequisite for passing a university degree.

Also, I find the US Hope Project, *Thinking Africa from the Cape* (not Cape Town), very much encouraging to adults to learn an African language. It would be ideal – almost utopian – if some Africans in South Africa were not only identifying with experiences of Africa that are only communicated within the linguistic limits and borders of English and Afrikaans language monuments. Knowing an African language in addition to English and Afrikaans, enables one also to experience Africa with a language that is intimately and mutually interconnected with Africa's complex indigenous knowledge systems. But which Africa? Whose Africa?

Vroue aan US maak groot impak

Vroue verbonde aan die universiteit laat hul naam geld en presteer op talle gebiede. Dié maand word Vrouedag gevier, en *Kampusnuus* berig oor 'n paar vroue wat die afgelope maand of wat op verskillende terreine 'n impak gemaak het. En 'n paar US-vroue vertel wat dié dag vir hulle beteken.



Prof Sulina Green

Prof Sulina Green, voorsitter van die Departement Maatskaplike Werk, is met die Stalsprys vir Maatskaplike Werk van die Suid-Afrikaanse Akademie vir Wetenskap en Kuns bekroon. Sy ontvang die toekenning op 7 September.

Volgens die Akademie word die Stalsprys toegeken vir " 'n hoogstaande publikasie of 'n reeks van hoogstaande publikasies, by voorkeur in Afrikaans, asook vir individuele of gesamentlike produkte van hoogstaande gehalte waardeur buitengewone bydraes tot die wetenskapsbeoefening gemaak word".

Die Akademie beskryf Green as 'n "deurwinterde akademikus wat oor baie jare haar bydrae tot maatskaplike werk en die wyer gemeenskap ten volle uitgeleef het".

Die prys word nie elke jaar aan 'n persoon in die veld van maatskaplike werk toegeken nie, maar vanjaar is die kategorie vir verpleegkundiges en maatskaplike werkers oopgestel.

Green, wat sedert haar skooldae in mense se welstand belangstel, het praktiese ondervinding as maatskaplike werker opgebou oor die jare wat sy by die Departement Gesondheid en Welsyn in Bellville gewerk het en het ook as toesighouer van maatskaplike werkers in die Stellenbosch-omgewing vir die ACVV Hoofbestuur opgetree. In 1975 het sy by die US aangesluit in 'n gedeelde pos tussen die Departement Maatskaplike Werk en die ACVV. Ná 13 jaar in die akademie is sy as medeprofessor aangestel.

Haar onderrig en navorsing

fokus veral op gemeenskapswerk, navorsing oor en teorieë in maatskaplike werk, asook welsynsbeleid. "Dit is uiters belangrik om sosiale netwerke wat gemeenskapsbou bevorder, veral in arm gemeenskappe, te bestudeer."

Oor die toekenning is Green opgewonde: "Ek was verbaas, want ek het regtig nie gedink ek gaan dit kry nie. Ek is dankbaar vir myself, maar veral vir ons departement. Hierdie toekenning is eintlik te danke aan my kollegas, die universiteit en welsynsinstanties wat aan my geleentheid gebied het om 'n bydrae te maak tot die uitbouing van die beroep van maatskaplike werk. Dit is te danke aan almal wat 'n invloed op my loopbaan, navorsing en onderrig gehad het."

Dr Kate Joyner

Researchers and health authorities in the United States (US) have shown interest in an interdisciplinary health model for providing appropriate care to victims of intimate partner violence (IPV), developed by Dr Kate Joyner and Prof Bob Mash of SU's Faculty of Health Sciences.

"Our collaborators at the University of Maryland are keen to pilot this model in Baltimore. And a big Africa-US comparative study is also on the cards," Joyner, a mental health and gender-based violence lecturer in the Division of Nursing, told *Kampusnuus*.

Joyner recently returned from meetings at the White House and State Department in Washington DC, where she briefed senior advisors for Disability and Women's Health Policy on her work. She also spent a week in Baltimore, exploring opportunities for interdisciplinary collaboration with the University of Maryland.

"Our model focuses on a neglected health issue. It is not good enough to simply patch up women who have suffered obvious sexual and domestic violence and discharge them. You have to consider the whole context and intervene comprehensively," Joyner said.

She pointed out that the interface between IPV and HIV is crucial in light of the fact that South Africa tops international rates of both HIV infection and sexual and domestic violence.

"IPV survivors generally receive only clinical care. Our model goes further. The patient is referred to an IPV champion for a comprehensive psychosocial and forensic assessment. Together they will develop a management plan, which will include the woman joining a life-skills therapy group for six weeks, and subsequently a community support group."

Joyner says this approach holds many benefits. "At the heart of any family system you will mostly find a woman. If you can strengthen her agency and functionality, it frequently results in improved relationships all-round."

Prof Karen Esler

It was an "empowering and informative experience" in America that persuaded Prof Karen Esler to join HERS-SA. Recently, she became the new chairperson of the board of this organisation, which is dedicated to the advancement of women in the Higher Education sector.

"In 2003, I was awarded a Mellon Foundation Grant to attend the HERS-USA Summer Institute, a one-month course focusing on grooming women for high level academic management positions," says Esler, who is associate professor in the Department of Conservation and Ecology at SU.

"Attending the course was really difficult because I had to leave my 18-month-old daughter behind, but it was such an empowering and informative experience, and I firmly believe I am where I am partly because of that experience."

This, she says, is why she has remained a staunch supporter of

HERS-SA. "I am delighted to serve the organisation as chair of its board, and to support the activities of Dr Sabie Surtee, our director."

HERS-SA has as one of its aims "to empower women to take leadership positions in higher education institutions in South Africa".

Through its conferences and programmes, the organisation has been able to provide career development for women in academia across sub-Saharan Africa. According to HERS-SA's website over 900 women from South Africa and other African countries have participated in the organisation's programmes.

Esler joined SU in 1995 in the Department of Botany after completing undergraduate studies at UCT and a Post-Doc at the University of California.

About the status of women in higher education today, Esler is outspoken: "It is no secret that women are still underrepresented



in academia, particularly in the sciences, and that this under-representation widens as one moves to higher levels in academia. I still see relatively few women in faculty and senate meetings."

In this respect, she adds, HERS-

SA provides a range of interventions which contribute to the career development of women in academia. "It was certainly instrumental in my own career path."

Anders as 'n gewone skakelbord, verskaf die kontaksentrum die persoon onmiddellik met die inligting wat hy/sy benodig, eerder as om die persoon deur te skakel na iemand wat hom/haar dalk net nog 'n keer na 'n ander persoon sal verwys.

“Indien iemand byvoorbeeld navraag doen oor toelatingsvereistes, kan ons hom/haar onmiddellik daarvoor inlig. Of as 'n maatskappy 'n produk wil laat toets, kan ons hulle presies inlig hoe om te werk te gaan en wie om te kontak,” sê Havenga.

Dit is juis waar die kontaksentrum se grootste sukses tans lê: 65% van alle navrae wat aan die US gerig word, word direk deur die sentrum beantwoord of opgeklaar. Dit is 'n groot aantal oproepe, aangesien die sentrum in Junie – 'n relatief stil tyd van die jaar – altesame 20 800 navrae hanteer het.

“Daar is allerlei navrae. Ons het op 'n tyd baie oproepe ontvang oor die waterfilter-sakkie (wat prof Eugene Cloete, Dekaan van die Fakulteit Natuurwetenskappe, ontwikkel het); daar kom baie oproepe van maatskappye wat produkte wil laat toets. Ons identifiseer wat die persoon spesifiek wil weet, en as ons nie self die antwoord kan verskaf nie, verwys ons hom/haar na 'n spesifieke persoon – iets wat nie in die verlede gebeur het nie. Dit is dus 'n beter diens en ons verbeter so die US se beeld,” sê Havenga.

Dit is 'n goed opgeleide span wat by

die sentrum, geleë op die grondvloer van Admin A, werk. “Almal het tersiële opleiding, en ses van die nege personelede het aan die US hul studies voltooi,” sê Havenga.

Volgens hom is die kontaksentrum nou daarop gefokus om die sentrale punt te word van waar inligting aan die US se eksterne kliënte versprei

word – ongeag of dit telefoniese navrae is of dié wat op die US se Facebook-blad of Twitter gerig word.

“Ons wil ook 'n tweede kontakpunt in die Neelsie oprig waar dieselfde tipe inligting verskaf kan word. Uiteindelik moet jy by enige punt kan navraag doen en presies dieselfde antwoord kan kry.”

Chemists to bring next Afro-Asian workshop to SU

In an effort to strengthen collaboration across continents within the field of chemistry, a group of young SU academics have entered a bid to host the next Afro-Asia Workshop on Advanced Topics in Chemistry in 2012 locally.

This follows the visit by Dr Katherine de Villiers-Chen, Dr Willem Gerber, Dr Alpheus Mautjana and Dr Stephen Pelly of the SU Department of Chemistry and Polymer Science to Bangalore in India in June, where they attended the first workshop of its kind. It was held in the Jawaharlal Nehru Centre for Advanced Scientific Research (JNCASR)

“We would like to reciprocate in an effort to further strengthen Afro-Asian partnerships and knowledge transfer within the field of chemistry,” says De Villiers-Chen.

The India workshop was organised in celebration of the 2011 International Year of Chemistry by the Academy of Sciences for the Developing World (TWAS) and the Regional Office for Central and South Asia (ROCASA). The Stellenbosch academics were part of a group of 40 participants from, among others, India, Nepal, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Egypt, Kenya, Nigeria and Ghana. During one of the sessions, participants were given an opportunity to give short presentations about their own research. De Villiers-Chen was awarded one of four TWAS Regional Prizes for Young Scientists to the value of \$1 000.

The major component of the workshop saw some of the JNCASR and Indian Institute of Science (IISc) professors conducting lectures on advanced research topics, including medicinal, environmental, bioinorganic, organic, nano, quantum and materials chemistry. Participants were also treated to tours to the \$10 million Titan Microscope at JNCASR and the Nuclear Magnetic Resonance Unit at IISc.

Also, the education technology unit at JNCASR hosted a special programme for science teachers and learners of matriculation age. The Stellenbosch academics were impressed with a comprehensive chemistry kit, which had been developed to introduce practical chemistry to schools that are unable to finance functional laboratories. “This initiative could definitely be tailored to a South African context, thereby increasing the reach of chemistry to disadvantaged schools here,” De Villiers-Chen says.

Sandra Liebenberg honoured by Wits

Wits University has bestowed special honour on Prof Sandra Liebenberg (picture), incumbent of the HF Oppenheimer Chair in Human Rights Law in the Faculty of Law at SU. Liebenberg recently graduated with a senior doctorate from the Wits Faculty of Law, Commerce and Management – only the fourth person in the history of the Faculty

to received the degree on grounds of a book publication.

The senior doctorate at Wits is reserved for published work of exceptional distinction. It must be, or be certain to become, the leading work in the field. In Liebenberg's case she received the degree Doctor of Laws for her book *Socio-Economic Rights: Adjudication under a Transformative Constitution*.

According to the citation read at the ceremony, Liebenberg now joins a very small and select group of legal scholars. "There have been only a handful of recipients of the senior doctorate in law in this University's entire history. It is extremely rare for scholarly work to reach the levels that are required for the award of the degree," the citation read.

"My academic research has focused over a number of years on how the hard-won socio-economic rights in the South African Constitution can be meaningful to the lives of those marginalised by poverty. It is an honour to receive this recognition for my work," Liebenberg said.

Drawing on a wide range of interdisciplinary resources, the publication provides an in-depth and thorough analysis of the socio-economic rights jurisprudence of the newly democratic South Africa. It also explores how the judicial interpretation and enforcement of socio-economic rights can be more responsive to the conditions of systemic poverty and inequality characterising South African society. Based on meticulous research, the work marries legal analysis with perspectives from political philosophy and democratic theory.

Research in Worcester

Survey shows youth is hardest hit by socio-economic challenges

A one-week survey conducted by the Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology in Avian Park in Worcester has revealed that the youth in this community is hardest hit by socio-economic challenges in this Boland town.

In January, a group of twelve Honours students and various staff members along with 10 volunteers from the Avian Park community in Worcester spent one week conducting a socio-economic survey amongst 220 households. "The survey provides a profile of households in terms of the household structure, level of income, education, type of employment and unemployment, level of food insecurity, health profile and other aspects such as teenage pregnancies," says Prof Lindy Heineken of the Sociology Department.

To assist with the survey, community volunteers between the ages 18 to 25 who had matriculated, but were unemployed, were trained together with the Honours students as fieldworkers. They underwent intensive training under the guidance of Mr Jan Vorster in fieldwork methodology, interviewing skills, research ethics and the content of the questionnaire.

Community volunteers, who successfully completed the training and practical work also received a certificate from the department. This will increase their chances in the job market and give them the opportunity to work as fieldwork volunteers for other SU departments as well.

According to Vorster the results obtained from the Avian Park survey reflect not only the challenges faced

by this community, but many of the challenges facing lower socio-economic coloured communities elsewhere in the Western Cape.

The results revealed, amongst others, that:

- Many of the problems in the Avian Park community relate to the youth.
- There is a high school dropout rate and more than half of those aged 20 to 29 have not completed matric.
- A quarter of the population lives below a poverty line of R552 per capita and often experience food insecurity. The median income from employment for men was R3 000 per month and for women R1 500.

- A large percentage of the inhabitants can be classified as "working poor", which implies that they are reliant on the state and/or community based organisations to provide social services (housing, health, education and social support).
- Drugs and gangsterism is a major problem within this community and there is little faith in the law enforcement authorities to address this.
- Despite the fact that Avian Park is a relatively stable and homogeneous society, there is a low level of social cohesion and lack of social capital to address the problems that beset this community.

While the university is already making an impact in terms of health related matters through the Ukwanda Rural Clinical School in Worcester, Vorster believes that it can "enhance its footprint by focusing on various youth development initiatives, stretching over a wide spectrum from sport development to education and training".

By involving students in this survey, the university also offers its students a new way of learning sociology and social anthropology. This model of learning – which combines community interaction, teaching and learning and research – was first initiated by Vorster in the

1990s and is now an integral component of the Honours Programme.

The other important aspect of this community interaction project is that it was inter-departmental. Through conversations with Prof HOFFIE Conradie, Director of the Ukwanda Rural Clinical School, a collaborative project between the Department of Sociology and Social Anthropology, Ukwanda and other participating departments were initiated.

Mr Jacob Du Plessis of the Sociology Department also collaborated with the Faculty of Health Sciences over the last two years through the Inter-professional Learning and Teaching (IPLT) group.

"SU currently has medical, human nutrition, social work, occupational therapy and physiotherapy students working in Avian Park. The results of the survey provide these students with a deeper insight into the needs and assets of the residents and serve as baseline information for their community projects. Although some research findings often land on a shelf, this research has produced specific results of relevance for the particular community and service sector," says Du Plessis.

Vorster adds: "Some postgraduate students will also do their thesis work in the area and will hopefully contribute to a better understanding of issues facing the community."

"Given the extensive nature of the dataset, the potential exists for further analysis of specific issues, and for the department to assist different stakeholders in this regard."

Proff Alf Botha (Biochemie) en Willem van Otterlo (Chemie en Polimeerwetenskap) van die Fakulteit Natuurwetenskappe het op 6 Junie in die Jannaschaal van die Konservatorium hül intreeredes gelewer, terwyl proff Kennedy Dzama (Dierkunde) van die Fakulteit Agriwetenskappe en Awie Greeff van die Departement Sielkunde onderskeidelik op 9 Junie in die JH Neethlinggebou en op 26 Julie in die Jannaschaal oor hül navorsing gepraat het.

Botha het op die rol van gis in die alledaagse lewe gefokus. Volgens hom word gis vandag nie net gebruik om bier te brou en wyn te maak nie, maar ook om vitamieene, fyn chemikalieë en bio-olie te vervaardig. Dit kan ook vir landboudoeleindes aangewend word.

Sommige giste verhoog die gehalte van gewasse, en ander keer dat bakterieë wat

siektes veroorsaak op beskadigde vrugte groei. Botha het daarop gewys sekere giste kan siektes by mense veroorsaak.

Van Otterlo het in sy intreerede gesê die bou van organiese molekules in geneeskundige chemie kan help om siektes soos kanker, MIV/vigs, tuberkulose en malaria te beveg.

Dzama het gepraat oor hoe diere-genetika kan help om voedsel goedkoper te maak. Hy het gewys op die direkte verband tussen die verbetering van vee se genetiese samestelling en die prys van produkte wat van hierdie diere afkomstig is.

Greeff se onderwerp was "Aspekte van gesinsveerkragtigheid in verskillende groepe gesinne". Hy het 'n oorsig gegee van gepubliseerde ondersoeke na gesinsveerkragtigheid in verskillende gesinspopulasies in SA en aanbevelings vir toekomstige navorsing gemaak.

Van wat ek verstaan, luister hulle na oor die 400 CD’s wat gekortlys word. Hierna word dit verder afgeskaal tot agt CD’s per kategorie.

Breedt het aan die Konservatorium gestudeer en was ’n sangstudent van Nellie du Toit. In 1990 het sy na Duitsland verhuis om daar haar loopbaan voort te sit. Sy tree deesdae wyd op in die groot operahuise van Europa, en tree vandeemaand op by die Bayreuth-fees van Wagner-operas in Duitsland.

Breedt kom een keer per jaar na Stellenbosch om meesterklasse hier aan te bied. Einde Oktober kom sy weer na Suid-Afrika en sal dan ’n kort bekendstellingstoer van die album onderneem.

Volgens Schumann beplan TwoPianists om Breedt se tweede album in Januarie in die Endlersaal op te neem.

Local poets call the State to order

A colloquium hosted by SU’s Department of Afrikaans and Dutch at the 2010 Versindaba poetry festival has resulted in a new anthology, *Letter to South Africa*, described as a “hard-hitting document of the moment”.

It came about when author, poet and lecturer Prof Marlene van Niekerk invited well-known poets to write a South African variation on Beat poet Alan Ginsberg’s “America”. In it, he had “expressed the dissatisfaction, but also the hope, of many Americans in 1956”.

Ginsberg’s latter-day South African counterparts responded enthusiastically, and at a packed public reading in September last year “vented their frustration, howled their anguish, declared their love, confessed their loyalty, claimed their rights, screamed in anger and offered their devotion” to their country.

The invitation to poets was also extended widely through the internet and university departments nationwide, and Umuzi, an imprint of Random House Struik, has now published a selection of submissions received.

In one of the poems Nosipho Kota asks:

South Africa, why do you spend your days playing golf, drinking expensive whiskies and smoking Cuban cigars, while mothers are dying in labour in our hospitals?

The anthology contains works in English and Afrikaans (with English translations). It is described as “a diverse collection, including many individual styles and varied points of view, all centred on addressing the state of the nation”.

An extract from a poem by hip-hop artist Jitsvinger reads:

*Kykkie’, hoor hie’:
Uit die smoortjie van my kultuur toor tradisies
’n Unique recipe wat ’n brug bou tussen rasse
Kolonialiste en slawe
Ek noemit Afrikaaps nè!
Dieper gesny as diamante, fyner as kristal
Drapeer ek my tong se godskleed
Suiwer soes kroeskop sonder relaxer*


He also points out:

Book captures Cape’s transformation

It was the need to answer the question how people feel about living in “a climate of remarkable change” that inspired an American anthropologist to write a book about South Africa and the stories that unfolded ten years after the country had its first democratic election.

Catherine Besteman, a professor of Anthropology and African studies at Colby University, was the speaker at the Alumni Relations’ first Brown Paper bag Lunch Discussion held in July on the Stellenbosch campus.

Besteman spoke about how her book, *Transforming Cape Town*, took shape and told how she wanted to take “a snapshot” of the change, the texture and emotions people had to deal with while going through

change (such as democracy). “I was equally interested in the people who had fears of the old rules that were gone as in those who had been emancipated.”

Research for the book was done in the Southern suburbs of Cape Town to the sprawling townships south of the N2 highway from 1999 to 2004.

Besteman said in the USA there is the notion that democracy solves everything and that talking about South Africa acts as a vehicle for Americans to talk about their own history.

The book, published in 2009, provides a window into the lives of ordinary South Africans more than ten years after the end of apartheid, with the promises of the democracy movement remaining largely

unfulfilled.

Through conversations with ordinary people, Besteman explores the ways in which apartheid’s legacies continue to shape interactions both intimate and public. It also explores the emotional and personal aspects of the transition to black majority rule by homing in on intimate questions of love, family and community, and capturing the complex, sometimes contradictory voices of a wide variety of Capetonians.

Besteman said themes that stood out were ignorance, fear of crossing old barriers, racism (that went all ways); conforming to standards in order to be accepted, decline under black rule and the “culture of politeness and cliques in Cape Town”.

Prof Owen Dean

A champion in the Chair

Prof Owen Dean is probably the leading expert in the field of Intellectual Property Law in South Africa, and is the first holder of the newly established Anton Mostert Chair of Intellectual Property Law in the Faculty of Law. He will hold this position for three years. KAMPUSNUUS talked to him about his new position.

Since 1974, Prof Owen Dean has been practising as an attorney in South African, and was also admitted to practice in Namibia and Botswana. He was a senior partner at the leading intellectual property (IP) law firm Spoor and Fisher, for which he now acts as a consultant.

What is the importance of this Chair, especially at a university and specifically for SU?

In South Africa, IP Law is presently not in a good state. It is necessary that a champion of IP should act as a custodian of the field and hold the government accountable for what it does, and does not do, in the field. The field also requires an injection of positive spirit that can lead to advances in the law and to it becoming more widely known and understood in both legal and lay or business circles. Above all, by undertaking work at a high level in the field, particularly in the area of post-graduate research and the publication of advanced papers,

the right legal environment for innovation and creative endeavour to take place on an increased scale in our country can be created. South Africa has in the past played a prominent role in IP internationally but this has flagged in the recent past. I believe that SU, with its Chair of IP, can make a valuable contribution, and in so doing emphasise its value and importance as a first rate academic institution. A university, and SU in particular, has the advantage over lawyers in practice in carrying out a custodian function because it has the freedom to be completely objective, and outspoken if necessary, in espousing certain views.

What are the general goals of this Chair?

The principal objective is to enhance the quality and depth of academic tuition, instruction and performance in the field of IP at SU and to broaden the base of tuition by offering courses in IP aimed at non-lawyers, such as scientists engaged in research and

people in business and advertising. In figurative terms, the Chair aims to propound the "gospel" of IP as broadly and as extensively as possible. A second, but not lesser, objective is to fulfil the role of a custodian of IP in South Africa. Thirdly, that SU should become highly regarded internationally in IP.

How does this new position complement the career you've had up to now?

I indeed had a career spanning 37 years as a specialist attorney in the field of IP. During this time I pursued academic activities as a sideline, which meant that my academic pursuits played a secondary role. Now, I have the opportunity to engage in academic pursuits as a first priority and I welcome this challenge. In my view IP is an area of the law that requires experience of active practice for it to be properly understood and appreciated. I feel that I can bring to the position of the Chair a blend of practical experience



gained at the coal face, so to speak, as well as academic intent and endeavour.

This Chair forms part of the SU HOPE Project, with its aims of community development. In what way will it contribute to goals of the HOPE Project?

Amongst the areas in which the HOPE Project is seeking to encourage and sponsor initiatives, is the promotion of competitive industry. In this context, a unit for

Corporate Governance in Africa has been established. The Chair fits neatly into this environment. The Chair should be recognised, and should function, as a unit for the promotion of proper protection for, and general awareness and knowledge of IP with a view to creating the right foundation and infrastructure for technical and scientific innovation and creative activity generally, especially in the fields of industry, business, the arts, culture and the internet and other electronic media.
