







Academic Information

Courses at Stellenbosch University are a mixture of lectures and seminars with individual laboratory time and library work. Students specialise early and study one or two disciplines for three or four years. In most subjects, assessment relies on continuous evaluation with assignments, orals, presentations, one mid-semester test and a concluding examination.



Academic Calendar

Honours programmes are generally a combination of taught modules (with seminars and laboratory time) and a research thesis component. Master's programmes are either a combination of taught modules (with seminars and laboratory time) or a substantial research thesis component or programmes based on research only.

Doctoral programmes have a minimum registration period of two years before the degree may be conferred. Students however typically study for around three years and are expected to work independently under the guidance of a supervisor.

Doctoral candidates in all faculties must submit a substantial dissertation and will generally be required to complete an oral examination.

The academic year consists of two semesters:



Each semester has a mid-term break (around May for semester one and September for semester two)

Library and information service

The Stellenbosch University Library (central library) is one of the biggest subterranean libraries in the world. The Library provides access to relevant, upto-date information resources, the latest information discovery tools and state of-the-art facilities. There are branch libraries servicing the different faculties, including the Theology Library, Music Library, Engineering and Forestry Library.

To access online databases and journals, as well as to reserve books and request interlibrary loans, consult the library website. Registered students need their student card to enter the library and borrow books.

Computer labs

Student support

Moving from the cosy confines of wherever you call home to the strange and wonderful (or initially far from wonderful) ways of a new land, a new people and a new culture, is no easy task. In fact, it rates very high upon the ladder of the most stressful things we do in our lives. To minimise the stress and hassles, inconveniences and insecurities - be well informed about each aspect of your new life.

Making the most of your experience

- · Interact with your neighbours.
- · Get out and about and explore the area on your own or with one friend (better yet with a South African friend).
- If you enjoy sport, find a way to continue with it the activity is also good for you!
- · Meet more often with other exchange or study abroad students and try to meet more local students - have lunch in the Neelsie Student Centre
- · Refrain from doing daily activities in large groups of friends from your home country.
- · Try to occasionally read the local news in the local paper (not just the news about home). This will give you a new perspective and enable you to converse much more easily with South Africans about issues that are important to them.
- · Talk to people from different walks of life (younger or older than yourself, not just students) when a safe opportunity presents itself. (Eg. - a store attendant initiates conversation with you.

- · Try not to be too critical of the host culture and ways, or to compare everything to home. Some things may work wonderfully in your own country but others are better here... Try to appreciate the culture for what it is - people over centuries have adapted their behaviour in different ways... making each culture so unique. Have an open mind, and let it enrich you.
- · Watch some South African television. Watching TV will also give you insight as to how this culture ticks.
- · Talking to South Africans that have visited your country about what they didn't like sometimes helps to open our eyes to the fact that, just maybe, your country isn't as perfect in every aspect as you thought.
- · Don't always frequent the same
- bars, cafes, etc.

Centre for student counselling and development

The Centre for Student Counselling and Development (CSCD) is committed to providing the Stellenbosch University community with **psychological**, **developmental** and **support** services. The staff includes psychologists (clinical, research, counselling, educational), a social worker, psychology interns, student assistants, project portfolio coordinators, support officers and administrative staff.

The functions of the CSCD are divided into the following services:

- Present developmental and counselling programmes that would lead to optimising the existing potential of students and empower them to confront contemporary challenges and problems
- Provide information and guidance regarding effective career development, choices and entrance to such a career

- Provide an office for students with special learning needs

Postgraduate office

Schools

If parents have the necessary documentation to work or study in South Africa, their children will be allowed to enrol at a local school on condition that the foreign child does not take the place of a South African child; and depending on the availability of places within the grade. At public schools, all students are under obligation to wear the correct school uniform. School fees are payable directly to the school and a refundable entry fee may also be required.



Neelsie Student Centre

The Neelsie Student Centre is the social heartbeat of the campus. This modern centre offers students a wide variety of commercial. financial and entertainment services. Community Based Programs of Stellenbosch University International

The community based programs of the Global Education Centre of Stellenbosch University International encourage students to engage with different communities in the greater Stellenbosch area. This allows students to broaden their understanding of contemporary South African issues. The focus is on educational initiatives that support the work of schools and other organisations with whom the office has strong relationships. Key programs include:

Global Service Learning (GSL) which is a for-credit experiential learning programme presented in collaboration with Ikaya Primary School in Kayamandi. It comprises extensive coursework and site visits working in Early Childhood Development

The community engagement programs which are designed to allow for deepened engagement with various communities in Stellenbosch without being academic credit bearing. Site placements typically focus on Early Childhood Development and Maths teaching support.

The volunteering program provides a space for students who would like to learn more about Stellenbosch and some of the challenges facing the town and region, but do not have the time for a more guided experience or who would like to explore volunteering for the first time. This program is run in collaboration with Vlottenburg Primary School and focuses on sports, crafts, and the arts

In addition the community engagement office facilitates connections to Maties Community Service and suggestions regarding other community engagement organisations in Stellenbosch.

Health and safety

Medical Information

The South African Department of Home Affairs requires Proof of Medical cover registered with the SA Council for Medical Schemes in terms of the Medical Schemes Act, 1998 and paid for the duration of studies annually. Students are strongly advised to read the contents of their medical cover carefully and deal directly with the provider.

Please note that Stellenbosch University is not affiliated to any medical cover provider. Stellenbosch University accepts any medical aid as long as it is registered in South Africa.

Personal Insurance

We strongly advise that you take out insurance for your personal belongings such as digital cameras and laptop computers. It is important that you are aware of the conditions of your personal insurance

Campus health

Safety suggestions

Safety is ultimately an individual responsibility and each person should actively develop his or her own personal safety strategies. Some suggestions are:

Where you live

- Establish relationships with hosts, neighbours and local authorities.
- · Always lock your door.
- Ensure access to emergency medical care.
- If you live on the ground floor, do not place valuable items close to an open window.
- Develop an emergency support/ communications network.
- Report any suspicious persons loitering around residences or instructional facilities or following you to the responsible authority;



When you travel

Do's

- · Project certainty regarding your route and destination.
- · Restrict night-time travel.
- · Inspect vehicle for safety (tires, overloading, brakes, etc.)
- · Notify Stellenbosch University International of your travel plans and possible contact number(s).
- · Determine the risk levels of different means of transport (bus. train, taxi).
- · Make sure that you know the traffic laws of SA.
- Travel with a friend/ trusted other.
- · Listen and heed the counsel you are given.
- · If you travel to countries beyond your programme site and expect to be there for more than a week, register your arrival at your consulate or the embassy with jurisdiction over the location.
- · Develop a plan for regular telephone or e-mail contact with your family so that they are at ease about your safety.
- · Avoid "high risk" regions. Check with Stellenbosch University International regarding unsafe areas in South Africa.



Dont's

- Do NOT hitchhike.
- Do not make use of public transport to Cape Town before Orientation Week as the trains are normally empty during holiday times.
- · Don't draw undue attention to vourself. either through expensive dress or personal accessories (cameras, radios, sunglasses etc.)
- · While travelling: Do not overnight in your car or take a nap. When tired, drive to the nearest town and rest.
- · Do NOT use your cell phone while driving.
- · Do not pick up hitch-hikers!
- · Do not drive after consuming alcohol and drugs/ Do not drive under the influence.
 - NB: Tourists are sometimes targeted at Automatic Teller Machines (ATM) and approached by people that either seek assistance or offer assistance.
 - · Keep other people at a safe distance when using an ATM (ask them to step back and stay behind the line)
 - Do not offer assistance but rather indicate that they phone the helpline.
 - · If you encounter any problems at an ATM, leave immediately but in the case of your card being 'swallowed', stay and call the number as indicated at the particular ATM.

Drugs and alcohol

- Avoid any involvement with drugs. Drug laws can be severe. Bail might be granted under certain conditions, but do remember that Stellenbosch University International does not take responsibility for paying bail for students. Do not assume that buying or carrying small amounts of drugs cannot result in your arrest.
- Be aware that alcohol abuse does occur amongst students at universities. This may occur for several reasons: as an international visitor, one may have a mistaken impression of how alcohol is used in the new country, South Africa may have a lower drinking age than elsewhere, or people abuse alcohol in an attempt to fit in.



Getting around

If you are interested in exploring South Africa, or just going on a short outing, there are plenty of options for hiring a car in Stellenbosch or Cape Town, for a weekend or even longer.

Buying a car

Students should be extremely cautious when buying a car, as from experience we know that students often spend more money repairing a second-hand car than the initial amount which was paid for the vehicle.

Students must ensure that the vehicle is roadworthy, registered and insured. It is a good idea to take out insurance for your car.

Feel free to consult Stellenbosch University International for a recommendation for buving a car, or getting a taxis / airport shuttle.

Getting around Stellenbosch

South Africanisms

Howzit

Greeting, often used instead



Ubuntu

Southern African humanist philosophy that holds as its central tenet that a person is only a person through others. I am because of you.

Braai

Brr-rve (roll that r): The South African version of a barbecue. It usually involves a large amount of meat such as boerewors (directly translated as farmer's sausage), lamb chops, steak, mealies (corn on the cob) and possibly a sprinkling of salad if you're lucky.

Sharp

Greeting, often used instead of hello. Combines hello and how are you so it saves time.



Rusk

A traditional Afrikaner breakfast meal or snack. Dried in South Africa since the late 1690s as a way of preserving bread, especially when travelling long distances. Their use continued through the Great Trek and the Boer Wars to now. Rusks are typically dunked in coffee or tea before being eaten. Google "Ouma Rusks" to see more about the South African obsession.

Lekker

Afrikaans for nice, pleasant, fun, lovely, good, pretty. It is used by all language groups however to express approval. You can feel lekker. You can have a lekker boerie on the braai. Holidays are lekker.

Ja No

A confusing exclamation which actually means yes.
