Alhoewel dit slegs die agste jaar is wat die Thuthukabeursfonds by Maties aangebied word, is dit vanjaar die 10de bestaansjaar van die Thuthuka beursfonds landswyd. Dit is 'n groot prestasie vir 'n beursfonds om in die huidige ekonomiese klimaat so lank suksesvol te wees. Die beursfonds het reeds byna 'n 1000 studente wat betrokke is by die program. Om die tiende bestaansjaar te vier het die studente 'n reeks aktiwiteite uitgevoer wat gestrek het van gediggies en liedjies vir Thuthuka te maak, 'n kanker bewustheidsveldtog en koekies op kampus te versprei.

Die Universiteit het ook 'n toekenning van die Suid-Afrikaanse Institute van Geoktrooieerde Rekenmeesters (SAIGR) ontvang wat die by wat die Skool vir Rekeningkunde tot die groei en transformasie van die professie erken het. Die Universiteit is een van slegs 15 universiteite landswyd wat betrokke is by die program. Die Universiteit en die personeel van die Skool vir Rekeningkunde was bedank vir die jare lange ondersteuning en toegewydheid om 'n verskil te maak in die lewe van verskeie studente.

Gemeenskapsinteraksie het sinoniem geraak met Stellenbosch Thuthuka. Tesame met die projekte wat jaarliks uitgevoer word, soos die studente wat as kampleiers by die Thuthuka Wiskunde kampe dien, die Dress-a-Kid program waar die studente help om kleredrag vir skool leerders befonds, het die Stellenbosch Thuthuka studente twee afsonderlike gemeenskap projekte geloods. Omdat hulle iets vir die Stellenbosch gemeenskap terug wou gee het hulle besluit om met 'n voedingskema in Stellenbosch te skakel en het vir die kinders in Cloetesville met toebroodjies en appels verskaf. Die studente het ook by die Saartjie Baartman Sentrum vir Vroue en Kinders in Manenberg betrokke geraak en het gehelp om die speelgronde by hierdie sentrum met vrolike kleure te vul deur die speelpark met helderkleure te verf. Die sentrum huisves ongeveer 50 moeders en kinders wat daagliks omstandighede van drank-en dwelmmisbruik sowel as mishandeling ervaar. Die studente het deur beide van hierdie geleenthede besef hoe bevoorreg hulle is en dat daar soveel mense en kinders het wat met minder as die basiese benodigdhede dag tot dag moet leef.

Omdat dit belangrik is dat die studente op hoogte bly van verwikkelinge in die werksplek en skakel met die professie, het die Stellenbosch Thuthuka program in 2014 ook 'n praktyk mentorprogram geloods. Elke derde jaar student het 'n gekwalifiseerde GR as 'n mentor ontvang. Die mentor se rol is om die student te mentor, leiding te verskaf en te blootstelling te gee aan die rekeningkundige professie en hulle toekomstige werksomgewings en industrie waar hulle mag werksaam wees in die

toekoms. Die program het baie positiewe terugvoer van beide die mentors en mentees ontvang en sal vir 2015 weer na die nuwe finale jaar studente uitgebrei word.

Soos in die verlede het die Stellenbosch Thuthuka alumni 'n groot indruk gemaak op die rekeningkundige professie, met alumni wat dien op verskeie komitees en professionele liggame. Die Stellenbosch Thuthuka Alumni het ook 'n groot rol gespeel in die stigting van die Nasionale Thuthuka Alumni verenging, 'n struktuur geskep deur SAIGR. Dit was 'n jaar van groei vir Thuthuka, maar ons het ongelukkig ook een van ons geliefkoosde student verloor. Nandi is tragies op die 2de Januarie 2014 oorlede. Nandi het in 2013 haar graad voltooi en sou in 2014 in die honneurs klas wees. Ons gedagtes is steeds by haar familie. Dit is baie tragies om 'n pragtige en belowende jong dame skielik te verloor.

Dit was 'n jaar van verander, 'n jaar van dink oor wat Thuthuka@Maties reeds gedoen het. 'n Jaar om te besin oor wat die toekoms moet inhou en ons te herinner waarnatoe ons oppad is. Thuthuka het reeds baie mense se lewes kom verander en hopelik gaan dit nog vele meer. Vir meer inligting oor die Stellenbosch Thuthuka program en ander nuus oor die studente, besoek gerus ons webwerf. SAICA Maths Development Camp 2014

"I'm someone in the future, and I look much better than I look right now."

These words echoed through the whole camp as we as camp leaders got ready to inspire and motivate the 163 grade twelve learners upon their arrival on the 6th July 2014 at the annual Western Cape SAICA Maths Development Camp hosted at the Cape Academy School for Maths, Science & Technology in Constantia.

The camp ran from the 6th-11th July 2014 and was co-ordinated by Betty Abrahams, project manager at SAICA.

On Sunday, the grade twelve learners were ushered into their respective rooms by the energetic and enthusiastic group leaders.

With the main goals in mind, these being to promote the CA (SA) career path, prepare the learners for the final matric exams as well as having fun, 1 co-ordinator, 3 training facilitators, 4 teachers, and 16 camp leaders set about accomplishing these goals in 6 days.

First up on the agenda, the learners were given a Zumba class. You must be thinking: "What?! A Zumba class at a Maths Development Camp?" . This would not only have physical benefits, but also give the learners some confidence for the week ahead.

With the week off to an exciting start, the learners were exposed to a variety of accounting firms. Freebies from the respective firms seemed endless. Some firms had presentations, while others opted for a less formal lunch or dinner option with the learners. Whichever way they interacted, they sure made a great impression on the learners by giving them a glimpse into their futures.

The school learners were then inspired, motivated and taught skills that would help them become successful business people. They were inspired by Preston Jongbloed as he shared his experiences, motivated by Thando Melane to find their purpose, and also enlightened on the importance of

personal branding by Karl Smith. As prospective Chartered Accountants, these lessons would lead to learners being well-rounded individuals.

Then the learners got to the academic part of the camp. They received Mathematics and Accounting lessons in English and Afrikaans by enthusiastic and dedicated teachers. Group leaders assisted the teachers with regards to any queries the learners had in the classes. The classes hosted at the camp and their previous knowledge would need to help them in the Mathematics and Accounting tests, which were to be written on 10 July 2014.

After the tests, learners were taken to Spur to enjoy dinner with team leaders, teachers, camp trainers and the co-ordinator. After the meal, all groups participated in the Fashion Show where learners had to make costumes out of materials including refuse bags, newspaper and juice bottle tops. The outcome was great. The Thuthuka Camp awards ceremony the following day not only marked the celebration of the top performing learners but an end to a camp that had truly exceeded my expectations. 

VARSITY ATHLETICS STARTS OFF TO AN EXPLOSIVE START

16 April 2013

Coetzenburg Stadium hosted the first of a three leg series in the Varsity Athletics. Whilst Maties struggled to reach the top three in the team event there were some credible performances on the night. The 2013 SA Senior 200m champion; Justine Palframan returned from a successful weekend to secure silver in the 400m women's event. Her training partner and team-mate Nabeela Parker took bronze in the 100m for women, proving once again that she is slowly starting to regain the form that saw her side-lined for much of the 2013 season due to an injury. The 18 year old Parker achieved a season's best of 12.12sec in the 100m.

Another top performer on the track was Jaden Flagg; who took bronze in the 400m for men. Flagg recently returned from the ASA Junior Championships with a bronze in the 400m in a personal best of 46.97sec and he will be looking to improve on that as the Varsity Athletics season moves on.

In the field events, the fast improving Wynand Carstens finished second to claim the silver medal just 24cm short of the winning distance. Birdie Carstens took bronze with a distance of 5.78m in the long jump for women.

As deel van Stellenbosch Thuthuka-studente se toewyding tot gemeenskapsdiens het studente geld ingesamel en daarin geslaag om 12 Afrika-pikkewyne by SANCCOB (the Southern African Foundation for the Conservation of Coastal Birds) aan te neem. Afrika-pikkewyne word bedreig, siende dat hul getalle met 64% in die laaste dekade gedaal het. Dit kos ongeveer R500 om 'n siek/beseerde pikkewyn ten volle te rehabiliteer en in die natuur vry te laat. Die geld wat ingesamel word, help met befondsing van die rehabilitasie. SANCCOB is 'n toonaangewende, mariene-georiënteerde, niewinsgewende organisasie wat al meer as 90 000 siek, beseerde, olie-besmette of verlate Afrikapikkewyne en ander bedreigde seevoëls behandel het sedert hul stigting in 1968. Onafhanklike navorsing het bewys dat die wilde Afrika-pikkewynbevolking 19% hoër is as gevolg van SANCCOB se bewaringspogings. SANCCOB is 'n internasionaal-erkende leier op die gebied van olie-besmette wild, rehabilitasie van wild sowel as die grootmaak van kuikens. Hul dra ook by vir navorsing tot voordeel van seevoëls, hul lei mense op om te sorg vir die voëls en leer die publiek om gedragspatrone te ontwikkel wat tot voordeel is van die mariene-lewe sowel as die omgewing waarvan dit afhang.

Thomas Edison said: "Opportunity is missed by most people, as it is dressed in overalls and looks like hard work", but Michellene Williams (BAcc honours), Nicole Radloff (third year BAcc) and Farren September (third year BAcc) from the Department of Accounting certainly did not miss their opportunity. These three young aspiring Chartered Accountants recently attended FirstRand Limited's first winter school on Banking in Sandton Johannesburg.







It started with an application during their examination period with the hope of gaining more insight into the banking and investment industry. This was the ideal opportunity to engage with industry experts and meet high profile leaders at FirstRand. It was an all-expense paid trip, which only required their enthusiasm and willingness to learn.

Among the week long activities in which they participated, was a share game challenge whereby each group had to invest and divest in shares of their choice, trying to be the most profitable for the week. All the student delegates realised that "playing the JSE" or in business terms trading, is not as easy as it seems. It requires knowledge, insight, an understanding of the wide variety of industries and companies and often a bit of luck. One common expression often used when a group chose a company's share was "guys we don't know what we're doing, we're just taking a gamble".

Among the leaders with whom these delegates engaged were Allan Pullinger, a qualified Chartered Accountant and the CEO of Rand Merchant Bank (RMB), which is one of the subsidiaries of the FirstRand Group. Very soon it became clear that at FirstRand it is not about positions or titles, which is evident from their flat organisational workforce structure. During the week many lessons were learnt, not only on the technical aspect of Banking, but wisdom and industry knowledge were shared as well. Allan, as he preferred to be called, emphasised the following: values and integrity are most important and by treating people right, they will in turn produce the required results. The students also had the opportunity to converse throughout the week with trainees on the FirstRand CA programme. The students also conversed with these trainees and a few top executives at a social cocktail evening. This proves that CA (SA)'s work hard and play hard. Nevertheless, this certainly allowed for a more informal, relaxed environment in which to engage with industry leaders. Among the top business leaders in attendance was Johan Burger, the Chief Operating Officer and Chief financial officer of the FirstRand Group, which inspired the three Stellenbosch students as he is a Stellenbosch graduate. He, like many in FirstRand, believes that great ideas do not stem from top management, but rather stem from the bottom and goes to the top. Other leaders were the Head of Accounting and head of the trainee programme for article clerks.

The student delegates were tasked with dealing with a credit application and they had to present it to the credit board as a practical assignment. This enabled them to attain first-hand experience in the day-to-day activities of a person known as a dealmaker in banking. This was no easy task! It entailed a quantitative and qualitative analysis, which included: deciding on a loan amount for their client, stipulating a loan structure, deciding on payment terms, determining collateral needed, applying industry knowledge, supplying a justifiable reason for all their decisions and being able to answer questions from the credit panel. It required long hours of work, and confidence to present. It is an activity that caused stress, but is also one which will not be easily forgotten and from which valuable lessons were obtained.

An important point that was continuously outlined to the students was that their three years of articles will be what they make of it. Opportunities should not be taken for granted; they should rather seek it and always go beyond what is required. This will show that they exhibit what is required of a well-rounded CA who is enthusiastic to do his/her work and driven for success and significance.

There are 34104 Chartered Accountants registered with the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants (SAICA) and only 6560 (19%) are black. The SAICA/Thuthuka Maths Development camps are one of the initiatives of SAICA to rectify this imbalance in the profession.



The Western Cape SAICA/Thuthuka Maths Development camp was coordinated by Betty Abrahams, a SAICA transformation project manager, and facilitated by 21 Thuthuka students from Stellenbosch University, University of the Western Cape and University of Cape Town. It was held at the Cape Academy of Mathematics, Science and Technology in Constantia from 23 – 30 June 2012.

More than 200 learners arrived anxiously, not knowing what to expect, but the icebreakers and Zumba-dancing activities quickly made them comfortable and excited for the week ahead. For some of them it was the first time they experienced taking a bath, sleeping alone in their own bed, eating healthy meals 3 times a day, engaging in a debating competition with fellow learners and even having dinner at Spur.

During the week highly qualified and experienced educators presented Mathematics and Accounting classes and the learners were tested on the work covered during the week. The learners also got the opportunity to meet and engage with top auditing firms, universities, the South African Reserve Bank and other influential people in the industry. The learners were motivated and encouraged to find their purpose in life, to be pro-active and to take responsibility for their own future, despite their current circumstances. At the end of the week an entertaining awards ceremony was held for the learners and it was presented by Freedom Hadebe (better known as Mandla from 7de Laan). At the awards ceremony the top and most participative learners were acknowledged and received awards.

Community service project

"Blessed are those that give without remembering and take without forgetting" This is the expression that sparked enthusiasm and involvement among Stellenbosch Thuthuka students to give their best towards their collective community service project, with their corporate sponsors KPMG and Media24.

In 2010, Stellenbosch Thuthuka approached KPMG Cape town to collaborate on a community service project as part of the Stellenbosch Thuthuka students' collective group project for the year of 2011. Thereafter, an intense search began to find a worthy cause on which to spend time and money for which a great benefit holds as well as to make a difference in the lives of disadvantaged individuals. This was also a means to foster a better relationship and expand communication links with one of Thuthuka's sponsors and to improve firm interaction.

KPMG advised us on certain requirements on which they will base their selection of a project which were the following:

- R10000 is available to execute any plans
- A community or greater part thereof must benefit and not an individual
- They must be able to utilize their staff members

Side by side, Michellene Williams one of the student leaders responsible for the portfolio of Community service and Firm interaction, together with Mr Riaan Rudman, Project manager of Stellenbosch Thuthuka, narrowed down and ranked all the projects ready for KPMG's approval. Various projects were considered. Eventually KPMG selected West Coast Winners Play School in Atlantis, in the area of Klein Dassenberg. This is a disadvantaged area, in which children get no physical or mental stimulation, are often times hungry. Job opportunities and transport facilities and money for transport are scarce.

Later Media24 came on board as a corporate sponsor providing R10 000 worth of educational books and toys. As the financial need to the project was great, KPMG contributed a further R5 000 and the Stellenbosch Thuthuka raised a further R10 000, making the total contribution R35 000. Through intense planning, preparation and continuous communication between the various parties, the small wendy house was thoroughly renovated on 31 March and 1 April 2011 by the students, KPMG and Media24 CSI staff members. The Thuthuka students went back a week later to finish some outstanding work.

The following was done to improve the structure substantially: a fence surrounding the wendy house was erected, the roofs and wall were insulated, and a jungle gym erected to provide physical stimulation, a lawn was laid. New educational books and toys were provided as well as tables and chairs to furnish the place, the structure was lifted to balance it and finally on the last day it was painted.

As co-coordinator of the project and communication link between the parties involved, Michellene Williams (3rd year student) said that from this project valuable lessons could be derived. "The project has taught me, as a student leader, the importance of delegation as all tasks cannot be completed by you, the leader as projects involve an immense amount of planning, administrative issues and executions of all plans. Communication is a key component to ensure that all the relevant parties are well informed, that correct information is transferred as well as that leadership and time management is crucial as too quickly it becomes hectic to

juggle academics, work and extra-curricular activities. Things do not also automatically happen as students often think but it takes time and patience, therefore I respect our project manager Mr Riaan Rudman and Mrs Links."

One of the students that participated in the event, Cameron Heynes gave his thoughts regarding this big event. "Dit was die eerste keer dat ons as Thuthuka student so 'n nou interaksie met 'n firma gehad het wat my 'n bietjie vreesbevange gehad het omdat ons nie eintlik weet nie wat 'n dag met CA's of die media sou behels nie. Die hele ervaring was baie aangenaam en nuwe vriendskappe is gebou bo en behalwe die project."

It is evident that being able to make a small difference is sufficient, as it does not take big events to change the world but merely a series of small actions made with the right heart's condition. Should the difference or effect be big or impact more lives, it is a bonus.

July 2009: Western Cape DST / Thuthuka Maths and Science Development camp

TheDST/Thuthuka Maths and Science Development camp was held from 28 June to 5 July at the Cape Academy for Maths, Science & Technology in Constantia. This camp was one of many camps around South Africa. The South African Institute of Chartered Accountants and the Department of Science and Technology gathered 198 top grade 12 learners from various schools in the Western Cape to contribute to development and learning and to enhance the learners chances for success in future years.

On arrival of the learners it seemed, the learners did not know what to expect. Many of the other learners rekindled old friendships, with friends they met while attending the 2008 camp. They knew what to expect. The camp was aimed at giving the learners the foundation that they need to prepare them for their examination and more importantly, taking them a step closer to reaching their

In her welcoming address, Ms Betty Abrahams (SAICA: Transformation manager) said, "The purpose of the camp is not only to assure academic excellence, but looks at development and transformation of young minds from a holistic perspective. As a selected learner, it is YOUR time to exhaust this opportunity, as most others only hope to be where you are".

The learners were welcomed by the very enthusiastic camp leaders. The camp was managed by 20 university students from various universities across South Africa, working together to inspire these learners to reach for their goals and dreams and also pursue a tertiary education at university. The camp leaders were responsible for managing, planning and co-ordinating all the daily activities. Their most important role was to be role models to the learners, sharing their experiences, knowledge of tertiary education and providing learners with information on different courses they attend. Lazola Maliti, who is in his 2nd year of BAcc at Stellenbosch University, forewarned the learners about the everyday challenges he faces as a BAcc student. He also emphasized the importance of having a social life as "all work, no play once made Jack the dull boy".

As in prior years the camp was packed with fun yet important development and learning activities, which challenged the learners physically and mentally.

- During the week the learners expanded their Maths, Science and Accounting abilities with lectures, tests and practical experiments.
- Various personal development and life skills speakers gave them guidance on their purpose in life, having better study and exam techniques and communicating assertively.
- The students saw the world from another perspective by being introduced to the Science World.
- The learners took part in various teambuilding activities, played various games and theatre sports and improvisation during the week, which culminated in talent show evening when the students showcased their talents that left the judges with difficult decisions to make.

September 2009: Thuthuka students doing something physical

Thuthuka students from all year groups took time out of their rigorous BAccounting schedules to brighten the lives of some 40 pre-school children at a crèche in Jamestown. Being bursary holders from the South African Institute of Chartered Accountants and in line with the profession's social responsibility, all Thuthuka students take part in community service. It was decided that the students would hold a project in which they collected money and that the proceeds would then be used to uplift the local community.

The need for proper development and stimulation in one's formative years has been recognised by scientists and educators alike; consequently, it was decided that it would be most appropriate, that a crèche: Sonstraal in Jamestown would be the beneficiary of their collection, where young children could be positively affected. It was decided that rather than simply donation the money collected to the crèche, that they would take the time to spend a day and play with the children.

First on the agenda, was the fund raising. Over the June/July holidays, the Thuthuka students raised money in their home towns and returned with a total of R6000. The students also secured a corporate partner, the professional services firm, PriceWaterhouseCoopers (PWC), to match the amount raised.

With a budget of R12000, ideas were workshopped and included:

- cleaning the premises;
- painting and decorating the outside walls;
- providing books, food parcels, cutlery and crockery, educational games, blankets and storage containers and much needed equipment to the crèche.

The students started planning and arranging the project. The project was managed by the second year students; however, the organising committee consisted of students from all academic year groups.

Finally, the weekend of the 18th of September arrived. The students went to Jamestown to spend the day at the crèche. Many of the children at the crèche are from the coloured Jamestown community and surrounding farms. 50 students and 40 pre-schoolers were crammed into the crèche playing games and listening to music in a very festive atmosphere. Afterwards the children were treated to lunch and boxes filled with sweets and other items.

When the children were left, the real work began. Donning latex gloves, the students set out to wash and paint the walls, redecorate the interior, clean and repack the kitchen, bathrooms and storage room and upgrade the facilities. The work was performed with an air of positivity as the facilities visibly improved.

Students arrived early and stayed late to make sure that the work would be completed before the end of the weekend.

It was all worth it; the outside walls were painted with brightly coloured pictures, the inside of the crèche was cleaned and the equipment replaced. The crèche received a complete make-over, inside and out.

The many hours spent planning and working at the crèche was well rewarded by the gratitude shown by the crèche's principal and children.

Die Stellenbosch Thuthuka Beursprogram bestaan uit vier hoofkomponente. 
Die laaste tog belangrike komponent is Dienslewering. Die Thuthuka-studente het gedurende die jaar individueel aan verskeie gemeenskapsinteraksie-projekte deelgeneem, wat wissel van vrywillige welwillendheidswerk tot die toepassing en oordrag van hulle nuut-ontwikkelde rekeningkundige kennis in hulle tuis-gemeenskappe. Van die studente het 'n gedeelte van die Junie-vakansie opgeoffer om op te tree as groepleiers by die Departement van Wetenskap en Tegnologie/Thuthuka Wiskunde en Wetenskap Ontwikkelingskamp.

Die Thuthuka- eerste- en tweedejaarstudente het besluit om as 'n groep terug te ploeg in die Stellenbosch gemeenskap, deur geld in te samel vir Funda Fundisa (wat Teach and Learn beteken). Funda Fundisa is 'n projek wat bestuur word deur studente van die Universiteit Stellenbosch, wat addisionele tutorklasse aanbied in Wiskunde, Wetenskap, Engels, Biologie en Rekeningkunde vir Graad 10- en 11-leerders aan Kayamandi Hoërskool buite Stellenbosch. Die projek het fondse benodig vir handboeke en skryfbehoeftes. Mnr Delano Williams het gesê hulle het besluit om die fondse in te samel omdat "History was made, as for the first time, Thuthuka Stellenbosch students gave back to the community. We also proved that we are not just a 'Help Mekaar' society, but also a 'Help Ander Ook' society and we want to keep that mentality."

Die Thuthuka-studente het ten doel gehad om voor 31 Julie 2008 ten minste R2000 vir Funda Fundisa in te samel. Die studente het besluit om op die harde manier die fondse in te samel deur van deur tot deur te gaan om geld in te samel. Hulle het die Suid-Afrikaanse Instituut vir Geoktrooieerde Rekenmeesters (SAIGR) genader, as korporatiewe vennoot, om elke rand wat hulle insamel te onderskryf en te verdubbel.

Teen nege-uur op 'n reënerige Donderdagaand (31 Julie) het die Thuthuka-studente R1 315 ingesamel. SAIGR het besluit, alhoewel die teiken nie bereik is nie, om wel die volle R2000 by te dra tot die fondsinsameling. 'n Tjek ten waarde van R3 315 is oorgehandig aan me Anet Boshoff en mnr Harri Kemp (Funda Fundisa).

Volgens me Boshoff sal die fondse aangewend word om boeke en skryfbehoeftes aan te koop. Toe Mnr Williams gevra is oor enige toekomsplanne, was sy antwoord: "Next time we will look to raise a much bigger amount as we have not at all showed the potential we have."



August 2008: "The Audition"

• Terugvoering te gee oor die DST/Thuthuka-kamp aan die Thuthuka-studente wat nie die kamp kon bywoon nie;



The DST / Thuthuka Maths and Science Development camp was held The DST / Thuthuka Maths and Science Development camp was held on the 8 th -14 th July at The Cape Academy for Maths and Science in Constantia. The learners arrived on the 8 th of July for a week, welcomed by the very enthusiastic camp leaders. There were 179 learners, both in grade 11 and 12 with vast backgrounds. One could see, the learners didn't know what to expect, all they knew was that they were the top learners from their respective schools.
