Sustaining peace through the management of the security-development nexus

The United Nations (UN) and the international community in general, is finding it difficult to find a functional model of securing and sustaining peace. Some relative success stories like in Ivory Coast, Sierra Leone and Liberia raise some hope. However, the UN missions in DR Congo, South Sudan and Mali are just recent examples of how difficult the international community through the UN finds managing conflicts to put in place sufficient peace sustaining measures. The so-called 'Hippo' report affirmed this in 2015, and the UN with the African Union (AU) have since been busy implementing the findings and recommendations of the report. The central role of chapter VIII organisations like the AU emphasized in the Hippo report raises a number of pertinent questions in relation to creating frameworks for sustainable peace engagements. How must the UN and AU balance the distribution of labour in future missions? How does future mission engagements secure a better connection between the issues in the Security Council and the development agenda / 2030 Global Goals also known as the security-development nexus? Advancing the importance of this nexus should be a unique one for the UN, in finding models for more sustainable peace engagements.
