• What are the minimum requirements (admission point score (APS)) to gain admission to the University?

Different Stellenbosch University programmes have different minimum requirements. However, it is important to note that meeting the minimum requirements does not necessarily guarantee you entry. Our faculties have only a fixed number of spots available, so conditional acceptance will be granted to the top candidates. In addition, some programmes are selection programmes, which means that other factors will also be considered.

How many first-year students does Stellenbosch University accept?

When considering the number of first-year students accepted per year, please keep in mind the following background information. Faculties have an overbooking system to ensure that they meet their targets each year. At the same time, they must still apply rigorous quality control so that they accept only the best students into their programmes.

In 2022, for instance, we received 73 000 applications, and roughly 10 000 students usually accept a conditional offer. As in previous years, we hope to finally register 5 500 first-year students.

How does applying to Stellenbosch University work?

Prospective students apply to us in their grade 12 year, using their final grade 11 results. Applications for the 2025 academic year will open on 1 April 2024 and close on 31 July 2024. Remember, we can only consider complete applications. Therefore, please follow all the steps to complete your application and upload all the documents requested.

Prospective students may apply for up to three programmes and will be considered for all three. This also means that an applicant may receive up to three conditional offers.

Applicants wanting to study at the University in 2025 must accept a conditional offer by 30 September 2024.

Are there any additional selection requirements to take note of?

National Benchmark Test (NBT)

Applicants wishing to study in the Faculty of Law (LLB, BCom Law, BAccLLB, BA Law) are required to write the NBTs before 30 July to be considered for selection.

With a view to the 2025 academic year, all School of Tomorrow applicants must write the NBTs before the end of 2024 to ensure that their results are available before registration in 2025.

• What is the difference between conditional/provisional and final acceptance?

Students are conditionally accepted based on their final grade 11 results. This provisional acceptance process takes place during your grade 12 year. Your final admission will be subject to your final grade 12 results. Therefore, final admission can only be granted once the results of the final exam have been released in January of your first year of study.

What funding options do I have available?

Students have various funding options available. Please start researching this well in advance, as the different options have different application processes and closing dates. Application for bursaries must be made during your grade 12 year.

What about my housing options?

Our undergraduate residences place 2 000 first-year students annually (1 000 men and 1 000 women). The remainder of the first-year students (3 500) choose either to live privately or to commute.

So, who gets to stay in residence, and what is the academic cut-off point? The cut-off varies, as it is determined by the academic strength of the application pool of the particular year. Generally, applying with an A average should give you a relatively good chance of securing place in residence, but is not a guarantee. The best advice to get a residence spot is to study as hard as you can to increase your average.

However, thanks to Stellenbosch University's cluster system, ending up in private accommodation or commuting does not mean you cannot be part of the student community. The cluster system creates physical, on-campus spaces for private students to meet and integrate with their peers in residence. We call these spaces "hubs" – where students can study and eat together. We already have two dedicated hubs, and we're planning to build a hub in each of our eight clusters.

• Is Stellenbosch campus safe?

As everywhere else in South Africa and the rest of the world, vigilance is key to ensure your personal safety. Keep valuables out of sight, remain aware of your surroundings, and try not to walk alone at night.

Campus Security is a service division of the University that helps all students, staff and visitors create a safe environment. Security officers patrol the University grounds and are trained to assist in the event of an emergency.

Some security services on offer:

Safety escort at night

If you need to move between campus buildings or from a building to your car between the hours of 20:00 and 05:00, consider asking a security officer to escort you.

Campus shuttle service

A campus shuttle service is available on central campus. This service focuses on the following needs:

- Transport between the general parking areas on the edge of campus and central campus during the day.
- Transport between the long-term parking area and central points at the residences at specific times during the day and night.
- Transport to and from service divisions and departments on the edge of campus (e.g. Food Science and Welgevallen), to and from central campus.

Safest routes

Always choose the safest route, even if it is not the shortest. Ideally, stick to Victoria and Bosman streets, as these are patrolled at all times. At night, a security officer is on duty in the mobile security kiosk. View security tips and services here: Your security

Which programmes are unique to Stellenbosch University?

- o AgriSciences Faculty offers 3 unique programme areas:
 - Viticulture and Oenology
 - Forestry and Wood Sciences



- Only Horticultural Sciences Department at a University in SA focusing on Deciduous, Citrus and Subtropical fruit as well as Cape Flora and Berries.
- Economic and Management Sciences Faculty offer these unique programme areas:
 - Diploma in Sustainable Development
 - BAccllB
 - BCom International Business, a combination of the BCom Management Sciences and the BA International Studies programmes. This four-year programme includes a six-month exchange.
- The country's first specialised School for Data Science and Computational Thinking, offering an interdisciplinary programme that comprises eight focus areas across four faculties. Its first intake was in 2021.
 - Analytics and Optimisation (Economic and Management Sciences)
 - Behavioural Economics (Economic and Management Sciences)
 - Statistical Learning (Economic and Management Sciences)
 - Applied Mathematics (Science)
 - Computer Science (Science)
 - Statistical Physics (Science)
 - Statistical Genetics (AgriSciences)
 - Geoinformatics (Arts and Social Sciences)
- All Engineering programmes, except the new Data Engineering stream, follow the same first year, which is unique and allows students some leeway to change their focal area, after successfully completing all the first-year modules.

- Leading the field in the move towards a carbon-neutral university,
 Stellenbosch University has launched a new School for Climate Studies in
 2021. This is the first school of its kind in South Africa that has the status of a faculty.
