We are excited to launch the Public Squares Training Programme! This year, we will offer the most popular (and feasible) workshop topics identified through the needs assessment that was done earlier this year.

The programme will kickstart in July 2024. To reach as many people as possible, we divided each event into two parts: a lecture and an interactive workshop. While the lectures are open to all Public Square teams and collaborators, workshop participation is limited to 30 people (5-6 people per Public Square).

For the workshops, we will first invite the Public Square teams that selected the particular topic in the needs assessment, giving them a limited time to confirm. If spaces are available after this time, we will invite all public square team members to attend. We still hope to run an intensive grant writing course in 2024. However, we have not yet managed to contract the right facilitator. We will let you know when we have news. In the meantime, we ask you to look out for notices advertising the SU grant writing workshop in August.

Please be advised that the brainstorming sessions are already up and running (see more information below). These have been a great success and we encourage you to contact Astrid to book a slot. We are already planning the programme for 2025, so please let us know if you have any ideas or suggestions. EVENT 1: Building an Effective Transdisciplinary Research Team

Presenter Bio:

John holds post-graduate degrees in philosophy, theology, and sociology and is working towards his PhD with a specific focus on developing context-relevant transdisciplinary research approaches for conducting solution-oriented research in a developing world context. His expertise is in transdisciplinary methodologies and methods for tackling complex social-ecological systems challenges. For the last ten years, he has been building and managing the TsamaHub an inter-faculty research centre at Stellenbosch University, which offers a transdisciplinary doctoral programme in sustainable development. John has been instrumental in raising international funding for conducting transdisciplinary doctoral programmes on food security and climate change on the African continent, known as the TRECCAfrica and ACCAI programmes.

EVENT 3: Impact in Transdisciplinary Research: Conceptualizing and Measuring

Presenter Bio:

Heide Hackmann joined the University of Stellenbosch on 1 July 2024, to hold a new Chair on Science Futures at the Centre for Research on Evaluation, Science, and Technology. She holds an MPhil in Contemporary Social Theory from the University of Cambridge in the UK and a PhD in Science and Technology Studies from the University of Twente in the Netherlands. Dr Hackmann's career includes more than 20 years of international experience in science and technology policy, global science strategy and systems development, and international science advice and diplomacy. Before joining the University of Stellenbosch, she served as Director of Future Africa at the University of Pretoria in South Africa (2022-2024); as the founding CEO of the International Science Council in Paris (2018-2022); and as Executive Director of the Council's two predecessor organizations, the International Council for Science (2015-2018) and the International Social Science Council (2007-2015). Dr. Hackmann continues to serve as an advisor to the United Nations and remains active on the boards of numerous international science for global science Science She is a Fellow of the International Science Council and a member of the Council's Global Sustainability Commission.

The purpose of this workshop will be to support the Public Squares researchers in maximizing the societal relevance of their research. The facilitation team will share expert insights and guide interactive discussions on effective impact assessment strategies for transdisciplinary research. Participants will engage in collaborative group sessions to unpack the impact opportunities of their projects and draft monitoring and evaluation frameworks to assess the influence and sustainability of their work.

Prof. Tulio de Oliveira is the director of the Centre for Epidemic Response and Innovation (CERI) and the KwaZulu-Natal Research Innovation and Sequencing Platform (KRISP). Prof. de Oliveira is a Professor of Bioinformatics at the School for Data Science and Computational Thinking, Stellenbosch University, and at the College of Health Sciences at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. Tulio has over 300 publications and is the PI on numerous large international grants.

They will bring this working document to the workshop and will be given 90 minutes to collaboratively edit it using some of the tips shared by Prof. de Oliveira. They will then present their document to the group to receive constructive feedback on how to improve the proposal.

Presenter bio

Prof. Joubert has over 25 years of experience in science communication, capacity building, teaching, and research, Marina is recognized nationally and internationally as a pioneer in the field and has published widely on the topic. For example, as a science communication strategist, Marina held a managerial position at the National Research Foundation for 15 years. Subsequently, she worked as a freelance strategist, managing communication and media for the South African Square Kilometre Array Project during South Africa's successful bid to host the telescope. Since she joined Stellenbosch University in 2015, she has taught and supervised many postgraduate students and has (co-)authored numerous publications. Additionally, in 2015, Marina launched Africa's first online course in science communication, which has successfully trained nearly 300 students from Africa and beyond. Her research interests include the evolving roles of scientists as public communicators, science communication through new online channels, the communication of contested topics and controversies, and building an evidence base for effective science communication training and practice.

FUTURE PLANS: List of workshops planned for 2025

- **Budgeting**: A workshop aimed at supporting research teams to think through the complexities of transdisciplinary research budgeting and financial planning across diverse research disciplines and non-academic sectors.
- An overview of participatory methods for transdisciplinary research: The purpose of this workshop is to provide an overview of different approaches that can be taken towards engaging and involving communities and members of the wider public in research. Public Squares groups will work together to consider how their projects will integrate community and/or public engagement and figure out why, how, where, and when to do this across the trajectory of their work.
- **Co-production in transdisciplinary research**: This workshop will engage Public Squares groups in the meaning and strengths of co-production in transdisciplinary research. New ways of mobilizing, weaving together, and applying diverse knowledge will be shared and discussed.
- Equity and inclusivity in transdisciplinary research: This workshop will engage Public Squares groups in the impetus of equity and inclusivity in transdisciplinary research. Guidelines for good practice will be shared and discussed.
- Ethics and responsibility in transdisciplinary research: This workshop will center on research ethics and researcher responsibility. Public Squares groups will work within their teams to map out and discuss the different ethical elements of their projects.
- Participatory methods: a practical workshop on mapping and drawing techniques: Public Squares participants will be engaged in practical hands-on activities to experiment with different types of drawing and mapping methods that can enable community engagement and involvement in research.
- **Participatory methods: a practical workshop on photovoice:** This workshop will provide an overview of 'photovoice', a well-established and widely used method for communitybased participatory research. Facilitators will guide the practice and ethics of working with photovoice as a participatory visual method to deepen research insights. Participants will work in their groups to consider how photovoice could enrich the findings and strengthen the impact of their Public Squares projects.
