It will be organised to provide exposure to the participants on how a curriculum could be ordered and organised to develop sustainability transitions competence. <p>D1 - Visit 2</p> <p>Pniël Museum and Church</p> <p>15 November 2022 14:00 - 17:00</p>	<p>Slavery, identity and segregation: Pniël and the emancipation from slavery</p> <p>Led by Matthew Cyster (Chairman: Pniël Heritage and Cultural Trust) and Dr Leslie van Rooi (Senior Director: Social Impact and Transformation, Stellenbosch University)</p> <p>The visit to this historic community (just outside of Stellenbosch on the Helshoogte Road) will allow for conversations and reflections on slavery, the emancipation from slavery and current day struggles as experienced by the local community. The tour will take place in an around the <u>Pniël Museum</u> and participants will be invited for a reflection in the tea garden adjacent to the museum.</p>

Cloetesville was historically created for “coloured” people in terms of the Group Areas Act (1950). The Group Areas Act was a central part of the Apartheid policy and aimed to eliminate mixed neighbourhoods in favour of racially segregated areas. Participants in the conversation are local community partners and higher education specialists in the field of development.</p>

By interrogating the way homophobic and transphobic cultures and ideologies at Stellenbosch University are upheld and maintained, the presentation will attend to the many ways that cisheteronormativity works in and across bodies, discourses, and practices to maintain social hierarchies. <p>D2 - Visit 2</p> <p>Rooiplein and SU Library</p> <p>16 November 2022 14:00 - 16:30</p>	<p>Visual redress: SU Special Collections and visual symbols on the Rooiplein</p> <p>Led by Ms Ellen Tise (Senior Director: Library and Information Services, Stellenbosch University) and Prof Elmarie Costandius (Department of Visual Arts, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Stellenbosch University)</p> <p>Part 1</p> <p>This conversation will look at how Stellenbosch University is handling visual redress within the context of the library's mandate for preserving all history. We should also ask ourselves if our Special Collections are indeed special for our stakeholders? And are we alienating a next generation of researchers by fulfilling our mission of access and preservation?</p> <p>Part 2</p> <p>The Rooiplein is a central gathering and walk-through space on campus, between the Neelsie Student Centre and the library. Amongst other things, the Rooiplein has been the centre of activities during student protests in 2016 and earlier this year. The conversation will engage in how students and staff in a mind-body way experience visual symbols in the form of statues, sculptures and architecture on the Rooiplein. How do we practically acknowledge and engage with the past and the realities of the present to imagine a different future?</p>

It is home to numerous historic sites and this tour will invite participants into the heart of the community. Some of the sites to be visited includes a former Stellenbosch University hostel, a space that housed migrant workers linked to the university, as well as the Kayamandi <u>Legacy Centre</u>. Participants will end the tour with a reflection at the famous dinner theatre and restaurant <u>Amazink</u>.</p>

<p>D3 - Visit 1</p> <p>Lückhoff High School</p> <p>17 November 2022 14:00 - 17:00</p>	<p>Die Vlakte and restitution</p> <p>Led by Renee Hector-Kannemeyer (Division of Social Impact, Stellenbosch University) and Wilfred Daniels (Former learner at the Lückhoff High School)</p> <p>The Lückhoff precinct that, for some reason, had been left standing amidst the ruin and the rubble of forced removals, is a constant taunting reminder not just of what has been lost and alienated in material terms, but also the continuing relationship of power imbalance and hegemonic dominance from the past that continues to shape the future of the town and its development (Hector-Kannemeyer and Van Noie 2021, p. 245).</p> <p>During this visit, participants will be able to engage with the history and current realities of Lückhoff and the community of Die Vlakte.</p> <p>More information: <u>Stellenbosch Work Centre</u></p>
<p>D3 - Visit 2</p> <p>Moederkerk, Drosty Street, Stellenbosch</p> <p>17 November 2022 14:00 - 17:00</p>	<p>Church and apartheid: Then and now?</p> <p>Led by Dr Wilhelm Verwoerd (Researcher, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Stellenbosch University)</p> <p>One of the Dutch Reformed Churches in Stellenbosch, the <u>Moederkerk</u>, is the second oldest congregation in South Africa. Its history is linked to the Dutch colonial past and this congregation, like many others of its time, promulgated separation in the church around colour lines. This visit to the Moederkerk will include a walk past the <u>Faculty of Theology</u> of Stellenbosch University and the <u>Oude Leeskamer</u> (site visit to the historic town).</p>
