Their thought provoking and inspiring leadership remarks and commentaries aim to offer new perspectives that reflect on current issues and address the overall forum theme.

“Catalysing Global for Sustainable



Dr. Elisabet Sahtouris, PhD is an internationally known evolution biologist and futurist, author and worldwide speaker teaching Living Economies, current human evolution, and How to Navigate our Perfect Storm of Crises. Following her post-doctoral fellowship at the American Museum of Natural History, she taught at MIT and the University of Massachusetts and contributed to the NOVA-Horizon TV series. Dr. Sahtouris is a fellow of the World Business Academy with an honorary Chair in Living Economies, and Advisor to Ethical Markets and other organizations. She is co-founder of the Worldwide Indigenous Science Network, and convened international symposia on Foundations of Global Sciences in Hokkaido, Japan and Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. She is a Professor of Business at Chamaine University in Honolulu. Her books include EarthDance: LivingSystems in Evolution, A Walk Through Time: From Stardust to Us. Biology Revisited (w. Professor Frank Tanser is a South African scientist whose research aims to evaluate and design intervention strategies to drive back the HIV epidemic and its negative consequences in communities hardest hit by the epidemic. His pivotal work over the past 20 years has provided substantial insights into the evolving and dynamic nature of the HIV epidemic and its key drivers, informing HIV prevention and treatment efforts in sub-Saharan Africa. His research into the population-level impacts of the antiretroviral therapy (ART) roll-out has led to wide-reaching and rapid changes to government policy on how ART programmes in South Africa are designed and implemented. In particular, a seminal study he published in one of the world's leading scientific journals – Science – was the first to show that nurse-led and decentralised HIV programmes in rural areas could be successful in reducing HIV transmission at the population-level.



Dr. Imtiaz Sooliman, Born in 1962 in Potchefstroom in the North West, the importance of community in Imtiaz Sooliman's life started in this small, four-district town where he lived with his family in a communal atmosphere. He began his schooling here and later moved to Sastri College in Durban. He qualified as a medical doctor at the then University of Natal Medical School in 1984, a career he later gave up in pursuit of his passions in humanitarian aid. As the inspirational founder, director and visionary of Gift of the Givers, a South African NGO founded in 1992, he has been instrumental in changing the lives of millions of people in more than 41 countries around the world. Gift of the Givers is the largest disaster response NGO of African origin, delivering life-saving aid in the form of search and rescue teams, medical assistance, nutritional support, water and basic necessities. It is also the first such agency to be accredited by the Proudly South African foundation. Imtiaz has put up hospitals, run clinics, created agricultural schemes, dug wells, built houses, developed and manufactured energy food, renovated fishing boats, offered scholarships, and provided shelter and food to millions through the organisation he founded.



Josef (Joe) Tayag, I'm an global health expert in organizational design, healthcare marketing, health systems financing, and program management in emerging markets. I currently manage a portfolio worth over \$60 million per year in investments dedicated toward delivering health care services to marginalized communities in South Africa. I advise ministries of health on massive health system reforms and help entrepreneurs grow health sector businesses. I have also helped broker private sector partnerships with technology firms, services delivery providers, medical device, and pharmaceutical companies. I've had on the ground experience supporting projects in Belize, the Eastern Caribbean, Ethiopia, Fiji, Ghana, India, Jordan, Kenya, Malawi, Nigeria, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, South Africa, Tanzania, and Uganda. I'm also trained in jungle survival techniques and improvisational theater.

Professor Thuliile "Thuli" Madonsela is the Law Trust Chair in Social Justice and Law Professor at the University of Stellenbosch, where she conducts and coordinates social justice research and she teaches constitutional and administrative law. She is also the founder of the Thuma Foundation, an independent democracy leadership and literacy social enterprise. An Advocate of the High Court of South Africa, Prof Thuli Madonsela has been a lifelong activist on social justice, constitutionalism, human rights, good governance and the rule of law. Named one of TIME100's most influential people in the world in 2014 and Forbes Africa Person of the Year 2016, Prof Thuli Madonsela is one of the drafters of South Africa's Constitution and co-architect of several laws that have sought to anchor South Africa's democracy. Among laws she helped draft, are the Promotion of Equality and Prevention of Unfair Discrimination Act, the Employment Equity Act and the Recognition of Customary Marriages Act



Dr. Yogan Pillay currently serves as the Country Director of South Africa at Clinton Health Access Initiative (CHAI). Before joining CHAI in June (2020), Dr. Yogan Pillay served as deputy director-general for health programs in South Africa's national department of health since 2008. Prior to that, he served the department of health in various roles, including Chief Director for Strategic Planning and Director for the district health system. Under his leadership, South Africa's immunization program expanded to include three new vaccines: rotavirus, pneumococcus, and human papillomavirus. He also helped introduce two popular mobile platforms to address youth and maternal health: B-Wise Improves access to health information for young people and MomConnect is a weekly text message service for pregnant women and new mothers. In 2011, he and his team began expanding access to Genexpert, an affordable testing platform for tuberculosis. He has also served on the ministerial committee on National Health Insurance (South Africa's version of universal health coverage) and led efforts to develop service benefits for various levels of care in the country. On July 8, Dr. Pillay was named a Paul Harris Fellow by the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International for his work on child health. Dr. Pillay earned his PhD from the Bloomberg School of Public Health at Johns Hopkins University



Professor Elmin Steyn heads the Division of Surgery at the Faculty of Health Sciences of Stellenbosch University and is head of Surgery at Tygerberg Hospital in Cape Town. She trained as a General surgeon and is a certified subspecialist Trauma Surgeon as well as an experienced Transplant surgeon. Previously Elmin was in practice at Christiaan Barnard Memorial and Vincent Pallotti Hospitals in Cape Town, where she set up the Trauma Emergency Centers and established the first private Renal Transplant program in Cape Town. Elmin has served on various professional bodies such as the SA Transplantation Society (past president), the Trauma Society (past president), the Organ Donor Foundation (chair), the Association of Surgeons of SA, and the Surgical Research Society. As international instructor for ATLS, NTMC and DSTC, she has been privileged to train surgeons in 36 countries on 4 continents (as well as a few islands) and has presented papers and keynote presentations at Trauma conferences worldwide. Elmin is co-editor of three editions of the Oxford Handbook of Trauma and has contributed chapters to several textbooks of Trauma Surgery. She served on the Board of the Western Province Blood Transfusion Service, is a current board member of the Health Professions Council of SA and is the recipient of various awards. Elmin is President Elect of the International Association of Trauma Surgery and Intensive Care (IATSIC), affiliated to the International Surgical Society.

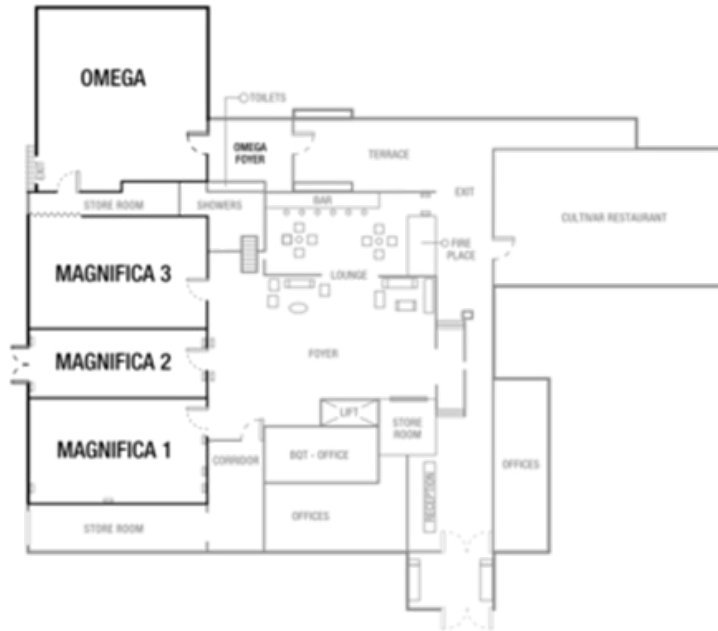
